Program Notes

When James VI of Scotland ascended to the English throne in 1603, Shakespeare must have been happy. A patron of Shakespeare's acting company and fan of the Bard's work, the newly re-titled James I forged a close relationship with the playwright. In return, Shakespeare penned *Macbeth*, a tribute to his king's Scottish lineage.

Shakespeare's version of the story, probably written in 1606, certainly had many literary and historical predecessors. The Bard cribbed the tale from his perennial source, Holinshed, who himself had worked off John Bellenden's translation of Hector Boyce's seventeen volume Latin language behemoth *The History of Scotland*. These versions were based on the life of the actual Scottish king Macbeth (1005-1057). Shakespeare's portrait of the king – an ambitious murderer tiptoeing on the edge of sanity - bears little resemblance to the historical figure. While the real Macbeth did kill Duncan I to become King of Scotland, he is also believed to have ruled equably, imposing law and order and encouraging devout Christianity.

The shortest and bloodiest of Shakespeare's tragedies, *Macbeth* twists history by introducing a number of supernatural and psychological elements to the rise and fall of the Scottish king. While it is not clearly known how James reacted to Shakespeare's sinister narrative, it is understood that the Bard intended the play to honor the new king's position, not defame it. The witches' prophecy that Banquo begin a line of kings is an obvious nod to James' family claim to have descended from the historical Banquo. And in a greater sense, the theme of bad versus good leadership would have resonated at the royal court, where James was working hard to develop his English version of the theory of divine right.
