Martha Graham and her company, of whom Helen McGehee, Ethel Winter, Mary Hinkson and Bertram Ross are Juilliard faculty members, performed at the Edinburgh Festival in August, then went to perform a two week season in London in September. In October, they performed for two weeks at the Lunt-Fontanne Theater in New York. On October 21, the Graham Company performed at Constitution Hall in Washington, D. C. in the third annual concert for the benefit of the United States Committee for the United Nations in celebration of the 18th anniversary of the United Nations.

Jose Limon and his company left on August 27 for a tour of the Orient. The three and a half month tour was presented by the Department of State and took the company to Australia, Malaysia, Thailand, Hong Kong, the Philippines, Formosa, Korea and Japan. Other Dance Department faculty members on tour with Mr. Limon were Betty Jones and Lucas Hoving, who in addition to performing, participated in television appearances, in lecture demonstrations and master classes.

Transforming a theatrical diversion into a dramatic art form, Martha Graham has established dance not only as an extension of her unique personality, but also as a new concept, as an expressive idiom that has profoundly influenced and molded the aesthetics and composition of dance today. In one of the major revolutions in modern art, she withdrew from the romantic tradition and formalized conventions of classical ballet to redefine the structure and content of the dance medium.

Her dance compositions based on American folk patterns and the work of Emily Dickinson have expressed her American heritage as perhaps the brooding, dramatic power of her art derives from her Irish inheritance.

Dedicated to her exacting discipline and uncompromising in her artistry, she nonetheless made plain her belief in the social responsibility of the artist by refusing, in 1936, the honors which were extended to her by the Nazi regime.

Wayne State University honors Martha Graham as dancer, teacher, choreographer but primarily as a creative artist giving form and meaning to the human experience.

As musician, artistic advisor, teacher, editor, critic and author, Louis Horst has influenced immeasurably the careers of leading modern dancers who have set out on new paths of creativeness in this age-old art. The breadth and depth of his knowledge of music literature, his skill as a composer for dance, and his insistence on principles of artistic integrity helped Martha Graham during the years of their association to reach her present eminence in the art of dance.

Throughout his long editorship of the magazine "Dance Observer" which he founded thirty years ago, Louis Horst has maintained the scholarly tone of its articles and critical reviews. His books on dance composition and his classes at the New York Neighborhood Playhouse, the Martha Graham Studio, the Juilliard School of Music, and his instruction at summer sessions at Bennington College and Connecticut College have made teachers of dance in colleges and universities his admiring and indebted students. His inspired teaching has had a direct bearing on the quality of choreography and college dance production in this country.

Wayne State University is honored to extend its recognition to the illustrious dean of American Dance.

SYLVIA WATERS, dancer, performed in the December 25 tele-8 vision performance of Menotti's Amahl and the Night Visitors.

Antony Tudor attended the premiere of his new ballet *Echoing* of *Trumpets* in Stockholm on September 28. The ballet was choreographed to *Symphony No.* 6 by Bohuslav Martinu and was performed by the Swedish Royal Ballet Company at the Royal Opera House. Following the performance Mr. Tudor went to Berlin to stage *Gala Performance* and *Ginselle* for the Deutsche Opera at the Berlin Festival.

Louis Horst, member of the Dance Faculty, died of a stroke on January 23 in Doctors Hospital, New York City. He entered the hospital a week earlier after suffering a heart attack. He was 80 years old.

Mr. Horst's career in the dance world really began in San Francisco in 1915 when the Denishawn Company urgently needed a conductor for ten days. At the time he was the pianist of an orchestra in a vaudeville house, but he agreed to conduct for the short period. Ten years later he left the company. By then he had become acquainted with Martha Graham, and in the following years he became closely associated with her creative struggles. Last year Miss Graham wrote in Dance Perspectives 16: "The truth is, I guess, that Louis Horst spoiled me . . . His sympathy and understanding, but primarily his faith, gave me a landscape to move in. Without it, I should certainly have been lost." Mr. Horst accompanied for Miss Graham at her New York debut in the twenties and was her musical director until 1948. He did not work exclusively with Miss Graham, however; he has accompanied for and assisted hundreds of young dancers. Among those who have come within the range of his influence are Doris Humphrey, Charles Weidman, Helen Tamiris, Agnes de Mille, and many others during their formative years.

Mr. Horst has been on the faculty of the Juilliard Dance Department since the Department's inception in 1951. In addition to teaching in several other schools in New York and Connecticut, he was also editor of Dance Observer, a modern dance magazine which he founded thirty years ago.

In 1955 he received the Capezio Dance Award "for his unique contribution to the modern dance as composer, accompanist, teacher, critic, and general forces for progress." Last month Wayne State University awarded him the Degree of Doctor of Humanities, citing him as "the illustrious dean of American Dance."

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ETHEL WINTER performed with her dance company at West Virginia State College on December 8. The performance was part of the College's Artists Series.

CORA CAHAN, leading dancer in the Norman Walker Company, performed with the Pauline Koner Company in a concert at the 92nd Street YMHA, New York City, on November 30.

KEVIN BRUCE CARLISLE is choreographer for the Garry Moore Television Show.

ETHEL WINTER toured in the South and Midwest during November and December with a small company which she formed.

MARTHA GRAHAM and her dance company, which includes HELEN McGehee, Ethel Winter, Mary Hinkson, Bertram Ross, Neomi Lapzeson, and Dudley Williams, performed at the Edinburgh Festival in August. In September the company performed in London for two weeks, and in October was seen at the Lunt-Fontanne Theater in New York City.

This fall Jose Limon and his dance company, which includes BETTY JONES, LUCAS HOVING, LENORE LATIMER, LIBBY NYE, ANN VACHON, CHESTER WOLENSKI, and JENNIFER SCANLON, performed in Australia, Malaysai, Thailand, Hong Kong, the Philippines, Formosa, Korea, and Japan on a tour sponsored by the State Department.

Martha Graham received the Degree of Doctor of Humanities from Wayne State University, Detroit, Michigan, on December 15, 1963. Miss Graham was honored as "dancer, teacher, choreographer but primarily as a creative artist giving form and meaning to the human experience."

Jose Limon is recipient of the 1964 Capezio Award. The Award is given annually for outstanding contribution in the field of dance.

RENEE LONGY was among the guest teachers at Leonard Bernstein's Young People's Concert Program which was televised November 29.

DONALD McKayle, dancer, directed the off-Broadway play, *Trumpets of the Lord*, which opened at the Astor Place Playhouse in late December.





DANCE IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

For the past three years the Lincoln Center Student Program has sponsored in Junior and Senior High Schools performances by solo and chamber music artists from Juilliard School of Music and productions by the Metropolitan Opera Studio company. These offerings have been made possible by grants from The Lincoln Center Fund. For this fourth year of the project dance was added to the series and was furnished by the Juilliard Dance Department.

As a preview, two special performances were held in the Juilliard Concert Hall on March 6 and 7. The school program consisted of excerpts from Antony Tudor's A Choreographer Comments and his Little Improvisations, the pas de deux from Swan Lake, and Kevin Carlisle's Part-Time Invention. The program was designed to fit into a regular public school assembly of forty minutes. Also given on these two evenings, though not a part of the public school program, was the premiere of Ray Harrison's Espial.

The group of fourteen dancers (not the same for every performance) played eleven times in ten schools. While most of these were in New York City, two were in New Jersey and one in Great Neck on Long Island. All of the performances were done during a two-week period, March 9-20.







Because this was, frankly, an experimental endeavor, reactions were eagerly awaited and somewhat surprising. For example, it was generally felt that audiences in the less privileged areas responded better than those where greatest enthusiasm was anticipated. The more privileged youngsters seemed too respectful they did not laugh, no matter what happened. Consequently, much of the humor in A Choreographer Comments was lost. But the Little Improvisations, depicting children at play, jogged the not too distant childhood memories of all audiences, bringing spontaneous and heart-warming reply. Though it was undoubtedly the most difficult dance to assimilate, Swan Lake captured the audiences by the beauty of its choreography. Of course, Kevin Carlisle's Part-Time Invention, with a jazzy score by Peter Schickele, drew cheers at every performance.


Facilities at the schools differed immensely. Stages ranged from adequate to one which was large enough to hold a performance by Russia's Bolshoi Ballet. Space for costumes changes was a constant problem, particularly in those schools which had no dressing rooms; the makeshift arrangements must have taxed the ingenuity of the building personnel.



The Juilliard Dance Ensemble, a highly accomplished company of advanced students standing on the threshold of dance professionalism, performed last evening (as they will again tonight) in a program featuring choreography by top professionals, Paul Draper, the late Doris Humphrey, Jose Limon and Anna Sokolow. The presentation in Juilliard's Concert Hall made it quite clear that this is the best modern dance group which Juilliard has produced since the days of Miss Humphrey, founder-director of the Juilliard Dance Theater. (After her passing, there had been a slump in quality in modern dance events at this school).

The first four numbers on the program constituted a preview of the program which the ensemble will take to high schools in New York City and vicinity as part of the Lincoln Center Student Program, sponsored by the Lincoln Center Fund. And the high school youngsters are lucky; Juilliard has prepared for them a varied and attractive program.

It opens with a revised, enlarged and adapted staging of Mr. Limon's "Concerto in D Minor" (Vivaldi), a lovely work in which classical music and modern movement idioms are exquisitely blended in a style which is flowing and yet strong. Then follow two premieres, one by Mr. Draper and one by Miss Sokolow, and a brief excerpt from Miss Humphrey's "Ruins and Visions.'

Mr. Draper's piece, set to music of Samuel Barber, is designed for four girls and is called "Sometimes." Its epi-sodes include We Start the Day, We Work, We Sing, We Dance.

Miss Sokolow's "Session for Six," with music by Teo Macero, is a jazz bit. For the most part, the movement responses are pretty bland (kind

of like watered-down Jerome Robbins) but towards the end, Miss Sokolow comes up with some spinning patterns which give her piece a brisk finale.

Part II of the Juilliard Dance Ensemble's program consisted of two new creations (neither to be shown on the high school series), one, Miss Sokolow's arresting "The Question" (to music of Webern) and, two, Mr. Limon's "Two Essays for Large Ensemble" (Bach). "The Question" is a maca-

bre piece (some of the dancers are painted with something resembling dried gore), disturbing, sad and searching. Mr. Limon's "Essays" are in complete contrast. They

are free, joyous and they sing of youth. In these two excerpts from a projected dance which will be dedicated to Miss Humphrey, Mr. Limon has used movement leit-motifs from major Humphrey works and woven them together with his own choreographic threads. So far. he has done a masterful job or reflecting Miss Humphrey's choreographic greatness.

Juilliard dancers give vibrant show, but audience is small

MIDDLETOWN

A vibrant and inventive group of dancers from the Juilliard School of Music performed Tuesday afternoon and evening at the Anthony J. Veraldi Junior High. The 12-member ensemble danced during the school day for ninth graders as part of a special one-year enrichment program and at night for the public.

The student group of advanced dancers from the conservatory presented a fascinating program - completely new to Middletown audiences - with works created especially for the ensemble by four famous living choregraphers. To add to the excitement, one of the choreographers world-famous Paul Draper, was present at the evening performance.

The ninth graders viewed the program with great interest - and well they should for the dancers were all young, attractive, talented, and some did not seem too many years older than the audience. Their dance movements were related to youth feelings today. The music, which was taped was provocative 20th century works.

Small audience

The evening performance however was poorly attended with not more than 60 people present. This was indeed a pity since it was an unusual program and the dancers were held over expressly for the public's enjoyment, especially for the parents of ninth graders whose children had viewed it in the afternoon.

It seems a sad commentary on parental interest and on general interest in the arts when 5,000 flyers had been sent home with students last week inviting parents to this and to the "Don Pasquale" Opera last Saturday, which was also poorly attended. Perhaps if the price had not been as low as 50¢ for students and \$1. for adults, more people would have thought it worthwhile to attend.

Four selections were presented in the one-hour program. The first one choreographed by Paul Draper, with music by Samuel Barber was called "Sometimes." It depicted in four sections the activities in a city person's day - from rising, brushing teeth, hanging on a subway strap to the joyful dancing at the end of the day. Humor, youth and life, motion and exuberance

abounded in this ballet. Four girls danced.

In "Ruins In Visions" which Doris Humphrey's created to music by Benjamin Britten, a newsboy, playfully taunts 2 young girls on a city street at night. And again life's humor pervaded.

Classical mood

A classical mood was set in Jose Limon's dance done to Bach's arrangement of Vivaldi's "Concerto in D Minor." Costumed in classical attire, in shades of greys and browns the 2 boys and 5 girls danced, this ballet without a storyline, with poetry, and expression.

The last was a Jazz Score set to music by Teo Macerto choreographed by Anna Sokolo. The steps here ranged from exaggerated ballet positions to movements that almost remembling the twist.

The total program presented by this attractive group of future dance professionals was one of contemporary moods and a dance form that this area, completely lacks.

The 9th grade student program was presented without charge to the A.J. Veraldi Junior High by the Education Fund of Lincoln Center. The evening performance was sponsored by the Middletown School System and the Greater Middletown Arts Council.

This was the fourth and final program in an unusually high-caliber series under sponsorship of the Veraldi School and the Greater Middletown Arts Council.

Poorly attended from the start, it nevertheless emerged as a highlight in the performing arts here. It opened with pianist Michael Rogers, followed by the Verderber String Quartet, both from the Juilliard School of Music. 

EARL CARLYSS was born in Chicago, but he grew up in California where he began his violin studies at the age of ten. He made his orchestral debut at fifteen, and that same year went to Europe for study and to appear in forty recitals throughout Scandinavia. Mr. Carlyss attended the Paris Conservatoire for two years and Juilliard for six, where he is currently a scholarship student of Ivan Galamian. In 1961 Mr. Carlyss participated in the Casals Festival in Puerto Rico, and in 1962 made his New York debut at Carnegie Recital Hall under the auspices of The Steven David Epstein Memorial Foundation and Boys' Clubs of America.

ROBERT SYLVESTER holds the William J. Henderson Memorial Scholarship at Juilliard where he is studying cello with Leonard Rose. He has won several major competitions including the "Music Talent in Our Schools," Music Education League's annual competition, and American Federation of Musicians Award. He has performed as soloist throughout New York and New Jersey. An active ensemble player, in 1962 he appeared at the Spoleto Festival, and in the Fall of 1963 with the Clarion Orchestra on their tour of the Soviet Union and Roumania.
