



#### OF JUILLIARD DANCE ENSEMBLE PERFORMANCES

Peter Mennin, President of The Juilliard School, has announced that the Juilliard Dance Ensemble's spring season will feature new works by Kazuko Hirabayashi and Anna Sokolow, in addition to New York premieres by Wendy Hilton and Helen McGehee and a repertory work by Jose Limon, on March 11, 12 and 13. The spring season is the major event of the year for the School's Dance Division, under the direction of Martha Hill.

There will be four performances, all in the Juilliard Theater. They will be at 3 and 8 p.m. Saturday, March 11; at 3 p.m. Sunday, March 12; and at 8 p.m. Monday, March 13.

The new Hirabayashi work, titled "Dark Star," is set to excerpts from "Vingt Regards Sur L'Enfant Jesus" by Olivier Messiaen. "Dark Star" will be performed on March 11 (matinee) and March 12, accompanied by Myron McPherson on piano.

The other new work, Sokolow's "Songs Remembered," will be danced on March 11, 12 and 13 to music by David Diamond.

"Divertissement from Les Festes Venitiennes" was choreographed by Wendy Hilton after Louis Pecour, with music by Andre Campra. Pecour was dancing master of the Paris Opera when the opera-ballet "Les Festes Venitiennes" premiered there in 1710.

His work forms the core of the New York premiere of "Divertissement," with additional dances by Hilton based on 18th century models.

The other New York premiere is McGehee's "Changes," set to Benjamin Britten's

# Juilliard Ensemble Offers Varied Dance

NE of the admirable things about the Juilliard Dance Ensemble is that it enables its members to perform works representing many choreographic styles. Thus Saturday afternoon's program at the Juilliard Theater included a premiere, a noted work from the modern dance repertory and a historical period piece.

It was the period piece that proved most attractive. In 1710, André Campra composed "Les Festes Venitiennes." which had choreography by Louis Pécour of the Paris Ópéra. For Juilliard, the Baroque dance scholar Wendy Hilton attempted a reconstruction of a divertissement from that work. Conceived as an outdoor entertainment in a palace garden, the suite was not only pleasant in itself but also served as a sampler of how 18th-century dance could be variously noble, whimsical and grotesque.

Bruce Davis portrayed a hopping Harlequin. Russell Lome appeared in a stately solo containing 18th-century versions of beaten steps that remain part of today's classical vocabulary. Yael Barash and Nan Friedman offered a pas de deux in which each woman moved as mirror image to the other. Teresa Coker and Ronald Harris-Warrick were sweet shepherds, and in the appropriately named "Air Comique" Tzipora Levenboim portrayed a nagging wife who kept jostling her husband (Richard Semmens).

There were also songs by the soprano Marta Marquez, for 1Sth-century ballets were apt to be what today might be called multimedia spectacles containing singing as well as dancing. The Juilliard cast was augmented by students of Miss Hilton from Stanford University, and Ronald Braunstein conducted the Juilliard Chamber Ensemble.

The premiere, Kazuko Hirabayashi's "Dark Star," contained eloquent moments, Yet those moments never sufficed to make "Dark Star" an eloquent whole.

Set to recorded music by Toru Takemitsu and a percussion score by Robert Waring, played live by the composer, "Dark Star" began grimly with Robert Swinston making a slow traversal of the stage. He was joined

by three drably clad women in movement that was always labored.

Just as "Dark Star" was about to seem a study in unrelieved distress, people in gaudy costumes entered. They played children's games and could have been figures from a storybook. Mr. Swinston returned, dressed as a clown. But the mood turned desolate again and Mr. Swinston seemed to be crushed by the weight of age and travail.

"Dark Star" certainly presented two disparate moods. Yet their relationship remained unclear. Conceivably, Miss Hirabayashi may have been trying to comment upon how careworn adults may remember childhood as an Eden. But, then again, she may have meant something else altogether. The parts of "Dark Star" remained more effective than the whole.

The matinee concluded with one of José Limón's best known group compositions, "There Is a Time," in a revival supervised by Daniel Lewis. The dance is a choreographic meditation upon the passage from "Ecclesiastes" that begins, "To every thing there is a season," and its admirers rank it among Mr. Limon's masterpieces. However, dissenters have pronounced it highminded but long-winded.

Juilliard's young dancers did not possess the passionate intensity that certain casts have brought to this piece. Yet neither were they guilty of bombast, as still other casts have been. If the emotions they conveyed were not always grandly scaled, at least they always seemed genuine.

# Dance: Mythology And Metamorphoses

WO NEW WORKS by two well-known modern-dance figures highlighted the final performance of the Juilliard Dance Ensemble's annual season Monday night at the Juilliard Theater.

Helen McGehee, once a leading dancer in Martha Graham's company, presented the New York premiere of her "Changes," while Anna Sokolow, long famous not only as a choreographer in her own right, but also a member of an earlier Graham company, offered a new work, "Songs Remembered." Neither piece was a major one, yet each made its points sharply and well on its own middle scale.

None of the above quite gives the flavor of Miss McGhee's tongue-incheek style in "Changes." Even the title is a play on the music used—Benjamin Britten's 1951 "Six Metamorphoses after Ovid," which was played refreshingly on the oboe by Anne Leek.

Each change in each of the dance work's six sections referred to a mythological figure. The tone became progressively lighter. "Pan, who made music with reeds and water," devised some clever and miasmic imagery for its reedlike undulating female ensemble. "Phaeton, who drove the sun chariot," had Russell Lome doing just that

with his fillies harnessed to his own

Susan Salinger was the hapless armsoutstretched figure in "Niobe, who mourned her dying children," while "Bacchus, who celebrates," made for some unexpected cavorting, including a girl who skated inside the pocket of her own dangling waist sash. "Narcissus, who loved his own image," showed Bruce Davis preening on a frame carried by a female collective symbolizing water, and ended with two women in a back fall and arms up waving. Reedlike.

"Arethusa, who became a fountain to escape the river god," showed the girl-chasing hero beautifully short-stopped as the centerpiece of a grouping or everyone's favorite Baroque fountain in the piazza.

Like Miss McGehee, Miss Sokolow, too, made use of a full company, with choreography suited to student performers. "Songs Remembered," to David Diamond's 1950 Quintet, had some surprises. If the first and fourth sections struck a familiar Sokolow note with its love-yearning couples, section II, with its childlike girls jumping straight up and down in print dresses, was a change in pace. This was also true of the Medusa cluster of women in the third section, fugitives of some mental slime, who separated out from under one another most surprisingly.

#### SYNOPSIS

"Heaven smiles on the happy who have trusted the God of all creation."

Calisto: final chorus

#### Prologue

Nature and Eternity praise the mortals who have climbed the stony path of virtue to the Heavens. They are joined by Destiny who insists that they add Calisto to the names of those written in the letters of the stars. Nature and Eternity question this addition, but Destiny promises that it is by Jove's decree and that her story will demonstrate Calisto's right to immortality.

#### Act I A parched forest

Jove and Mercury descend to earth to inspect the damage of a drought which has parched the earth and dried up the rivers. On this inspection tour Jove is stricken by the beauty of Calisto, a young follower of Diana. To impress her he brings the waters back to life and restores green to the forests. Calisto is awed and delighted until Jove begins to make amorous advances. She repulses him, insisting that she will remain a virgin forever. Jove appeals to Mercury to help him win her; Mercury suggests that Jove disguise himself as Diana. When Calisto returns to the spring for a drink she finds her "Goddess" very affectionate. At first surprised, then obedient, and after the first kiss, joyous, Calisto goes off with "Diana."

The young shepherd Endimion wanders to the spring, lamenting his love for Diana, a love he knows she will never reciprocate. He sees Diana coming through the woods hunting, and hides. Diana, alone, confesses that her vows of chastity are binding her painfully, for she — the Virgin Goddess — is in love. The object of her affection is none other than Endimion, who knows nothing of her passion. Linfea, an aging follower of Diana, catches up. As they are leaving, Diana catches sight of Endimion. She can show nothing of her passion in front of Linfea who, "protecting" her mistress, chases away the young man. Calisto returns, bursting with joy at her new experiences in the woods. Seeing Diana, she begins to speak of "their" love-making. Diana, outraged, expels Calisto from her order, and storms off. Calisto is heartbroken and confused by this sudden apparent change in Diana's mood.

Linfea, left by herself, admits that her aging virgin bosom harbors occasional lustful desires. She is overheard by Satirino, a teenage Satyr, who offers himself to satisfy her inclinations. She repulses him with insults. Pan appears seeking Diana to propose marriage. Diana refuses his offer as an insult, and Pan is brokenhearted.

#### Act. II Scene 1 The summit of Mount Latmos

Endimion sings about his love for Diana and finally falls asleep. Diana has followed him alone and, admiring the sleeping youth, even dares to kiss him. Endimion dreams that he is holding Diana in his arms and awakes to find that it is true. She admits her love, but is conscience-stricken about her vows of virginity. She leaves him, but promises to return soon.

Satirino, who has been spying to avenge both Diana's insult to Pan and his own anger at Linfea, witnesses this scene, and runs off to tell Pan.

#### Scene 2 The Plain of Erymanthus

Juno, having heard rumors of Jove's escapades, comes down to earth to find him. She meets Calisto, mourning. From Calisto's description of "Diana's" embraces, Juno realizes she has discovered her husband's latest fancy. At this moment, Jove, still disguised as Diana, enters with Mercury. Unaware of Juno's presence, he makes another assignation with Calisto. Juno reveals herself, vents her anger, and leaves. Endimion enters and rushes up to "Diana". As they are embracing, Pan enters, led by Satirino, and they take Endimion captive. Jove and Mercury retreat from this increasingly confusing situation, leaving Endimion abandoned. He is dragged away by the satyrs. Linfea enters, looking for a suitable object for her desires. Satirino decides to give her the "sweetest of all revenges" for her previous insults, and with several of his companions sets about it.

#### Scene 3 The source of the Ladon

As Calisto waits for "Diana", Juno, leading the Furies, finds her and they punish her by turning her into a bear. Juno, consoled by her revenge, returns to the heavens.

#### Scene 4 Another part of the forest

Pan prepares to torture Endimion, because he refuses to renounce his love for Diana. She arrives and drives away his tormentors. Together at last, they vow eternal love.

#### Scene 5 The Empyrean

Jove, in his own form, transforms Calisto back to human shape. Then he elevates her to the stars as Ursa Minor, so they can be together forever. D.F.O.



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

#### PETER HERMAN ADLER

Peter Herman Apler, Director of Juilliard's American Opera Center since 1973, was born in Jablonec, Czechoslovakia, and graduated from the Prague Conservatory of Music. He started his operatic career in Brno, Czechoslovakia's second largest city and Janacek's home town. It was there that he conducted a new production of Jenuja in a German translation, with the composer advising on such matters as translation and casting. After Brno, Adler became Music Director of the Bremen Stadtsoper in Germany, going to Russia when the Nazis took power, and conducted in Leningrad, Moscow and Kiev, where he was for three years Chief Conductor of the Ukrainian capital's symphony.

He came to the United States in 1939, making his debut with the New York Philharmonic in 1940 and guest conducted many of the major American orchestras. In 1949 he founded the NBC-TV Opera which he directed until 1959; and, after a period as Music Director of the Baltimore Symphony. later continued his pioneering television work from 1970 to 1974 with the emerging Public Television network. He made his Metropolitan Opera debut in Un Ballo in Maschera in 1972 and appeared there the following year as conductor of Manon Lescaut featuring Leontyne Price, whose opera career he had helped to launch in the NBC production of Tosca and The Magic Flute.

During his activities with both commercial and non-commercial television he regularly commissioned new scores, beginning with Amahl and the Night Visitors, the first opera ever commissioned for television; and following that, he commissioned operas from Lukas Foss, Norman Dello Joio. Boleslav Martinu, and later Thomas Pasatieri and Hans Werner Henze.

Dr. Adler's previous performances with the American Opera Center have included the New York premieres of Bloch's Macbeth, the original version of Ariadne auf Naxos, and Dvorak's Rusalka.

#### GERALD FREEDMAN

GERALD FREEDMAN'S last production for the American Opera Center was the unique synthesis of Moliere's Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme and Ariadne Auf Naxos as it was originally conceived by Strauss and Hofmannstahl. He made his San Francisco Opera debut in 1976 staging the world premiere of Angle of Repose by Andrew Imbrie, and had previously received recognition for his staging in San Francisco of Britten's Death in Venice (1975), Monteverdi's Orfeo (1972) and Bach's Saint Matthew Passion (1972 and 1976). His additional operatic credits have included the world premiere of Ginastera's Beatrix Cenci in 1971 for The Opera Society of Washington, which opened the Kennedy Center; and Die Fledermaus, L'Incoronazione di Poppea and Idomeneo for the New York City Opera Company. He has also recently staged Verdi's Otello for the Arizona Opera Company.

Active in legitimate theater as well, Freedman directed the Broadway musical The Robber Bridegroom; Mrs. Warren's Profession with Ruth Gordon and Lynn Redgrave; and a revival of The Little Foxes with Lee Grant, Carroll O'Connor and Burgess Meredith. Prior to that he won praise for his television production of Antigone with Genevieve Bujold; the Broadway productions of Arthur Miller's The Creation of the World and Other Business; Hamlet with Stacy Keach, James Earl Jones and Colleen Dewhurst; and the award-winning Colette with Zoe Caldwell.

In 1966 Gerald Freedman made theatrical history with his production of Hair for the New York Shakespeare Festival's Public Theater. As its Artistic Director he won an Obie for The Taming of the Shrew, followed by successful productions of The Tempest, Electra and Peer Gynt, among others, He has directed seventeen Shakespeare plays in all.

He has been Co-Artistic Director with John Houseman of The Acting Company and is the newly appointed Artistic Director of the American Shakespeare Festival at Stratford, Connecticut.

#### JOSEF SVOBODA

JOSEF SVOBODA, a native Czech, is one of the most innovative designers in the theater today. His designs for costumes, scenery and lighting-"scenographs" as he prefers to call his work-have been seen in most of the great theaters of the world and extend from productions for the legitimate theater to operas and ballets and, occasionally, films.

His American debut took place in 1965 for the Opera Company of Boston, collaborating with Sarah Caldwell on a production of Luigi Nono's Intoleranza. Since then his work in this country has become best known through the series of multiscreen films shown in the Czechoslovak pavilion

His work has been the subject of many books and articles, and a recent book by Jarka Burian, The Scenography of Josef Svoboda, documents some sixty key productions in great detail.

#### SARKA HEJNOVA

SARKA HEJNOVA, graphic artist, painter and costume designer from Prague, has designed costumes for Little Mermaid, House on Porici, and many other films for the Czechoslovak Film Studios in Prague. She has adapted many Czech classics, including Snow Queen, for Laterna Magika, and for the National Theatre in Prague designed Jenuja, Fidelio, and Macbeth. Most recently she designed the costumes for Tristan und Isolde at the Grande Teatre de Geneve. Sarka Hejnová is the daughter of Josef Svoboda.

#### PAVEL SMOK

PAVEL SMOK has had an active career in Eastern Europe as a dancer, choreographer and ballet director. After completing his studies at the Prague State Conservatory he danced with various groups before becoming ballet master in Usti and Ostrava. In 1964 he co-founded the Prague Ballet and was its ballet master until 1970.

Now a freelance choreographer in Czechoslovakia, he has choreographed many ballets and television productions including Rossiniana (1961), Frescoes (1966), to music of Martinu, and three different ballets to the music of Janacek: Intimate Letters (1968), Glagolitic Mass (1969) and the Sinfonietta (1971). He will make his debut at the Metropolitan Opera this Fall as choreographer for its new production of The Bartered Bride.

#### THE STORY OF THE OPERA

#### Act I: Late autumn in a quiet Moravian village.

Jenufa waits anxiously to hear if her beloved Steva is to be drafted, for she is carrying his child and her secret will soon be common knowledge. Steva's stepbrother Laca secretly loves Jenufa, but tries to hide his feelings by making comments about her to his grandmother—who owns the nearby mill—and to the mill's Foreman. The shepherd boy Jano enters, thrilled that he can read and thanking Jenufa for teaching him. It soon turns out that Steva is free of duty and he staggers in with some boisterous recruits, musicians and villagers, who break into a rowdy dance. The noise incurs the displeasure of Jenufa's foster mother, Kostelnicka, the Sexton's Widow. Remembering her own drunken husband, she tells Steva he can marry Jenufa only after a year of teetotaling. Grandmother Buryja sends everybody away, leaving Steva alone with Jenufa. He doesn't seem eager to wed her at any time for when they are alone he is petulant and annoyed at her plea for marriage. After he leaves, Laca returns, needling Jenufa and finally quarreling with her. Torn between love and jealousy, he slashes her cheek with the knife he has been using to whittle. She runs into the house, and the servant Barena tells the others it was an accident. The Foreman accuses Laca of hurting Jenufa deliberately.

#### Act II: The dead of winter.

While everyone thinks she is in Vienna working as a servant, Jenufa has remained hidden at home and given birth to a boy. Though she is happy with the child, Kostelnicka cannot bear the shame. She has secretly sent for Steva, and after giving Jenufa sleeping medicine, she tells him about the baby and kneels before him, begging him to wed Jenufa and claim his son. Although torn by his conscience he refuses to take a disfigured bride; in fact, he is now engaged to Karolka, the mayor's daughter. Now Jenufa's distraught foster mother turns to Laca, who is eager to marry the girl but so taken aback to hear about her baby that Kostelnicka on an impulse pretends it is dead. There is only one way out for her now, she feels. Taking the child, she heads for the frozen millstream to drown him. When Jenufa wakes, she prays for her child's future, but her foster mother returns to tell her that she has been in a coma for two days and the baby has died. She also tells her of Steva's coming marriage. Laca returns, humbly offering himself to the girl, but she reminds him that she has neither wealth nor honor. Does he want to marry a girl who has already given herself to another man? Laca insists that he loves Jenufa despite her past mistakes, and so, conquered by grief and kindness, more than love, Jenufa agrees to become Laca's wife.

#### Act III: Two months later.

Jenufa is about to marry Laca, who has become mature and dependable since his engagement. Among the guests are the mayor and his wife—who loudly notices that Jenufa isn't dressed for a wedding—and Steva with his coquettish fiance, Karolka. Barena and some other girls arrive with flowers, and Grandmother Buryja blesses the couple. Suddenly a commotion outside interrupts the ceremony. Jano runs in to say a drowned baby has been found in the thawing millstream. Kostelnicka's nerves give way. Jenufa identifies the corpse as that of her child. Everyone turns on Jenufa, but Laca defends her, and her foster mother's confession abruptly ends the false accusations.

As Kostelnicka is led away to face her punishment, Jenufa forgives her, then turns to Laca and offers him his freedom. But he again declares his love for her, and since she has grown to love him too, they turn away from the tragedy to start a new life together. The river is running again. Spring has returned.

#### BIOGRAPHIES OF CAST

The Juilliard American Opera Center is designed to provide young singers at the advanced level with performance experience between the final stages of training and the beginning of full-time careers in opera. Membership is gained through competitive auditions. All those accepted work with members of the Juilliard voice, coaching, acting and conducting faculties.

ELIZABETH Coss (Kostelnicka) has rejoined the American Opera Center after an absence of several years. After graduating from the Eastman School of Music she was heard with the Baltimore Symphony and the Rochester Philharmonic and made her Metropolitan Opera debut last Fall as Marianne in Der Rosenkavalier. She is a vocal student of Beverley Johnson.

ROSEANN DEL GEORCE (Jenuja) is a native of Chicago and since coming to New York has studied with Oren Brown. After graduating from the University of Wisconsin she appeared with the Madison Civic Opera and has also appeared with the Milwaukee Symphony. She has also sung with the Santa Fe Opera and was twice a winner of the Metropolitan Opera Regional Auditions.

Tonio Di Paolo (Steva) is singing his first tenor role for the American Opera Center although he came to Juilliard two years ago as a baritone to do the title role of Chabrier's The Reluctant King. A recipient of two grants from the National Opera Institute, he was formerly a student at the Eastman School of Music and has sung principal baritone roles with the Chautauqua Opera, the Omaha Opera and the Virginia Opera companies.

GAIL DOBISH (Jano) is a member of the Juilliard Opera Training Department and has appeared in its productions of *The Magic Flute*, as Papagena, and in the title role of Cavalli's *La Calisto*. She studies with Daniel Ferro.

ZEHAVA GAL (Mayor's Wife) was born in Israel where she was trained as a pianist, and came to Juilliard at the suggestion of Jennie Tourel. Now a student of Daniel Ferro, she has appeared as Marcellina, Baba in The Medium and the title role in Savitri for the Opera Training Department, and sang Suzuki in Madama Butterfly for the Opera Center this season.

RODNEY GODSHALL (Mayor) was born in Pennsylvania and attended Oberlin and Indiana University before coming to the American Opera Center this year. Now a student of Daniel Ferro, he has been engaged to sing principal bass roles with the Regensburg Stadttheater in Germany for next season, and will make his debut there in May as Prince Gremin in Eugen Onegin.

MARTA MARQUEZ (Barena) is a Master of Music student at Juilliard and studies with Beverley Johnson. She was born in San Juan and has sung with the Opera Company of Puerto Rico as Frasquita and Barbarina. For the Opera Training Department at Juilliard she was Papagena in The Magic Flute and for the Opera Center has previously sung Kate Pinkerton in Madama Butterfly.

JACOB BEN-ZION MENDELSON (Laca) joined the AOC in 1976 and sang Pinkerton in this year's production of Madama Butterfly. After receiving his degree from the Hebrew Union College he moved to Miami where he sang Don Jose, Alfredo and Nemorino. He now studies with Richard Torigi.

# ACADEMIC REGULATIONS AND PROCEDURES

The academic regulations and procedures at Juilliard are few and simple. The Dean and Assistant Dean are responsible for the overall educational program of the School and for reviewing each student's educational progress. The Registrar is responsible for class assignments required to carry out that program and for keeping a complete record of each student's assignments and progress.

#### STUDENT CONDUCT

The Juilliard School has long been recognized as a major performing arts institution, enjoying and respectful of a reputation and influence that are world wide. It is assumed that any student accepted for study at Juilliard has made a total commitment to his chosen field and that, in many instances, genuine hardships and sacrifices have been made in order to begin or continue study here.

This commitment signifies complete dedication to study, work and performance to the best of the student's capabilities. It also demands no compromise that would affect the standard of excellence expected of the School.

A student who alone, or in concert with others, deliberately damages or destroys School property, or who acts to prevent or impede the holding of any class, lesson, rehearsal or performance, or the attendance of others at any such class, lesson, rehearsal or performance, is subject to expulsion, and to appropriate action by the civil authorities.

Any student or group of students not unreasonable in number, shall have the right to meet with the President, or with any one or more members of the Administration designated by the President, to voice grievances or make suggestions, provided that such student or group gives advance notice in writing to a member of the Administration.

#### **ATTENDANCE**

You are expected to attend all classes and lessons regularly. One and one-half hour classes will begin on the hour (or half-hour) and end fifteen minutes before the half-hour (or hour). Hour classes end ten minutes before the hour (or half-hour). Promptness is essential. Unexcused absences or repeated tardiness may result in dismissal.

#### PARTICIPATION IN ORCHESTRA

Orchestra concerts at Juilliard are one of the major performance opportunities of the season. Regular attendance at rehearsals throughout the year is required and it is expected that players will arrive at each rehearsal in advance of the announced starting time. No excuses will be accepted for an absence other than in cases of proven illness. The initiative for clarifying an absence lies with the student, who will be expected to contact the Assistant Dean. Any student not complying with these regulations is subject to disciplinary action, depending on the nature of the infraction. This could mean suspension or expulsion from the School and/or possible loss of scholarship aid.

#### **EXCUSED "CUTS"**

Students may be allowed limited additional absences on the basis of official excuses, as follows:

A. Medical Excuses. Illness is a valid excuse for absence, but only if you have reported your illness to the School Nurse. Immediately upon your return to School after an illness, you should report to her office, Room 203, bringing with you a doctor's report. She will file this report and issue an excuse slip which must be presented to all instructors whose classes you have missed.

All medical excuses from participation in required courses, class studies, or performance, must be obtained from the School's consulting physician. Appointments should be made through the Nurse's Office. Medical excuses for orchestra and chorus rehearsals must be filed in the Assistant Dean's Office. Any student excused from chorus, orchestra or ensemble in the field of his major study for reasons of health will not be permitted to participate in extra-curricular performances under

School suspices. Medical excuses are valid for one semester only and must be renewed each semester.

Unexcused "cuts" should be utilized to cover such minor illnesses as colds, etc.

Each student will be allowed the number of unexcused "cuts" corresponding to the number of credits for the course.

- **B.** Professional Engagements. Limited leaves of absence for professional engagements may be granted by the Dean or the Assistant Dean only after the student has obtained the teacher's permission. Students must secure permission before making any contract or commitment to persons or organizations outside the School. Any program biography of the appearance should mention that the performer is a fully-enrolled student of the Juilliard School. In no case should absences conflict with rehearsals, concerts, and other School functions.
- C. Rehearsals Scheduled by Juilliard. The Administration makes every effort to keep such conflicts at a minimum. However, when large forces of chorus and orchestra are combined, some conflicts may occur, and absences will be excused upon notification by the Assistant Dean to the Faculty.

#### ABSENCE FROM MAJOR LESSON

If you are unable to attend your major lesson or a rehearsal in which you are a participant, you must notify the Faculty Secretary, in advance.

# CHANGE IN COURSE OF STUDY

You must complete each academic year in the course of study (Bachelor of Music, Diploma, etc.) for which you are matriculated. Requests to transfer from one course to another for the next academic year should be filed **in person** with the Registrar before May 12, 1978.

# TO CHANGE MAJOR

Applications to change your major should be filed in person at the Registrar's Office, before May 12, 1978. You will be required to take an entrance examination in the new field and pay an examination fee when you apply for a change. You may, however, reserve a place in your present major study pending the results of the new examination.

#### CHANGE IN MAJOR TEACHER

A change of major teacher will be authorized only if the reasons for such a change are deemed valid by the Administration and your current major teacher. Requests for a change of major teacher must be initiated in the Office of the Dean.

#### TO CHANGE TIME OF MAJOR LESSON

Arrange any changes in your scheduled lesson time directly with your major teacher.

#### CHANGE OF CLASS SUBJECT

You are responsible for all classes on your schedule. If you fail to attend a scheduled class without having previously obtained written official permission to drop it, you will receive a failing mark in the class. You can receive credit only for the classes for which you are registered. The School will not allow credit for attendance in a class for which you have not completed registration. No addition, cancellation, or change of a subject will be official unless recorded by the Registrar. Cancellations of required subjects must have the approval in writing of the Assistant Dean. Application for such changes should be made in writing to the Registrar. Except for changes made on the initiative of the Administration, program changes after the first ten days in any semester will require payment of a \$5.00 fee.

If permission is granted to drop a class in which you are failing work, the failure will be recorded. Subjects may not be dropped after the tenth week of each semester.

You are responsible for the work already covered in any new class to which you have been admitted after classes have begun.

#### CHANGE OF CLASS SECTION

Except on the initiative of the Administration, you will not be permitted to change a class section after the first ten days of each semester. Application for section changes during the permissible period should be made with the Registrar.

#### **EXAMINATIONS**

You are required to take all examinations, both in your class work and in your major subject,

at the announced time. If it is necessary for you to change the time of a final examination, you must obtain permission from the Registrar.

#### GRADING

The School awards point credit for class work on the basis of regular attendance and satisfactory completion of all assignments and examinations. Juilliard records your grades as follows:

- A Honors
- B High Pass
- C Pass
- D Low Pass
- E Condition (This is a probationary grade)
- F Failure
- IA Insufficient attendance, a failing grade
- I Incomplete, signifying that the student's work, though of passing quality, is incomplete as to required assignments. If the requirement is not completed within a month after the final examination, the mark will be interpreted as a failure.

At the close of each semester you will receive a photostatic copy of your complete record.

#### REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION

Detailed information on requirements for graduation in the various courses offered will be found in the Juilliard catalog, page 62.

#### **PROBATION**

You may be placed on probation for any of the following reasons:

- A. Grades or attendance in your major study or class work fall below the standards of the School, or
- B. In the opinion of the Faculty or Administration, there is doubt as to your ability to meet graduation requirements or
- C. Any action is committed which, in the opinion of the Administration, is detrimental to the welfare of other students or to the School.

If this unsatisfactory situation continues, you may be requested to withdraw from School.

#### DISMISSAL

You may be requested to withdraw from School at the end of the academic year if progress is not satisfactory.

You may be requested to withdraw from School at any time during the academic year if:

- A. Your attitude or deportment conflict with standards deemed desirable by the School;
- B. You are apprehended in the theft of School property, including library books and materials, or the property of others in the School;
- C. Your remaining in School will endanger the health of either yourself or others; or
- D. Your conduct alone, or in concert with others, deliberately damages or destroys School property, or prevents or impedes the holding of any class, lesson or performance or the attendance of others at any such class, lesson or performance.

#### REQUEST TO WITHDRAW

If you wish to withdraw from School, you should make your request in person to Room 222.

#### **FOREIGN STUDENTS**

The Registrar is adviser to foreign students and should be consulted in all matters pertaining to visas, restrictions on employment, immigration reports and applications, and other specialized questions concerning foreign students.

#### **TEACHING FELLOWSHIPS**

Each year the School awards students showing outstanding promise as teachers a number of Teaching Fellowships in L & M, Piano Minor, Orchestral Conducting, Choral Conducting, Opera, Stagecraft, and Instrumental Instruction. These Fellowships, carrying a stipend, offer advanced students teaching experience in Juilliard classes under the supervision of the Faculty. For information inquire at the office of the Assistant Dean.

# CONTROLLER'S OFFICE

The Controller is responsible for all financial operation in the School.

#### **IDENTIFICATION CARD**

An official Identification Card will be issued to you. This must be carried at all times and must be presented upon request by any member of the Administration or any of the School guards. If you do

not have your Identification Card on your person when asked to show it, you may be asked to leave.

This card is issued for your use only. Report its loss to the Controller's office. You are responsible for any use of this card prior to the report of its loss. If you withdraw from school, this card must be returned to the Controller.

#### TUITION

All enrolled students are liable for the full amount of tuition. For detailed information concerning tuition fees see the catalog, pages 41-42.

#### NEW YORK STATE TUITION AID

Students who are residents of New York State may in certain cases be entitled to tuition aid from the State. The Controller's Office has the necessary information and application forms. Some other states may offer similar grants; you should consult the education office of your home state.

#### SCHOLARSHIPS AND FINANCIAL AID

See pages 17-18 for information regarding scholarships, and Financial Aid Fund, etc.

#### LOCKERS

Lockers may be reserved in the Controller's Office for your use during the School year. The lockers are large enough to hold music, books, and small instruments; there are a few larger lockers available for students with larger instruments. Lockers are located on the third and fourth floors.

# LIBRARY

LIBRARIAN: BENNET LUDDEN ORCHESTRA LIBRARIAN: BAIRD HASTINGS

#### LOCATION

The Lila Acheson Wallace Library is located on the fifth floor. The Orchestra Library is on the third floor, Room 317.

## **HOURS**

9:00 AM to 9:00 PM, Mon. through Thursday 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM, Friday 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM, Saturday

#### CIRCULATION

Books and music circulate for a two-week period with a two-week renewal period if the re-

newal is made on or before the due date. Extended loans for the duration of a semester may be made by special arrangement at the circulation desk for materials required for ensemble classes. Materials reserved for class assignments are limited to overnight use beginning one hour before closing time and must be returned by 10:00 AM the following day. Records do not circulate.

#### **OVERDUE BOOKS**

A fine of 50 cents for the first week or part thereof and of \$1.00 for each additional week or part thereof is imposed on each overdue book. If the fine is paid at the time the item is returned, the charge is reduced by half.

For overnight loans, a fine of 25 cents is levied after 10:00 AM, the hour they are due.

#### LOST BOOKS

The loss of books or music should be reported at once to the Library to prevent the accumulation of overdue fines which are in effect until such reports are made. Charges of current replacement cost plus a \$5.00 service fee per item are imposed for lost materials.

Failure to return library material on loan or reporting it as lost when, in fact, it is in the borrower's possession, constitutes theft and will be disciplined in accordance with school regulations (see sections on Probation and Dismissal).

# STUDENT SERVICES OFFICE

ADMINISTRATOR: MRS. MADELEINE ALBRIGHT

All matters pertaining to scholarships, financial aid, housing, placement, student service and counseling are handled in Room 233.

#### **SCHOLARSHIPS**

Scholarships are awarded on the basis of jury examination and general scholastic standing. All students in the Diploma and Degree courses are eligible to apply. Scholarships are awarded in varying amounts, depending upon the financial resources of the student and his family.

Since the award of a scholarship represents recognition of special talent and ability, all qualified students are advised to apply for them. Honorary scholarships, carrying no financial assistance,

are awarded eligible students and become a part of the student's record.

Scholarships are awarded for one year only; you must apply and be examined at the end of each year to determine the renewal of a scholarship.

Scholarship information and application forms are available in Room 233.

#### FINANCIAL AID

A Staff member is available for consultation as to the most appropriate form of financial assistance for the individual student.

The School has a modest Student Aid Fund, from which it may assist students in emergencies. Requests should be made in Room 233.

In addition, Juilliard participates in the National Defense Student Loan Program, the College Work Study Program and the Educational Opportunities Grant Program. Limited funds from these programs are awarded by the School depending upon the student's financial need. Application should be made each spring prior to enrollment. Students must reapply each year for consideration.

Advice about student bank loans, state loans and scholarships is available through the Student Services office and assistance in filling out and processing of forms is handled in Room 233.

#### **PLACEMENT**

Juilliard offers professional guidance and employment assistance to students and alumni. This service includes assistance in finding part-time employment for students and full-time positions for alumni. Many employers, in the music profession and outside, turn to The Juilliard School for recommendation of qualified personnel and these requests are handled in Room 233.

In order to avail yourself of this service, you must register in Room 233, and supply the necessary information for setting up your file. To this may be added confidential information from the faculty.

#### CONCERT APPEARANCES

The School frequently receives requests for solo and ensemble performers from schools, colleges, hospitals, civic organizations, etc. Some of these are volunteer performances, while others are

paid engagements. If you are interested in such performance opportunities you should visit Room 233.

#### **ACCOMPANYING**

In addition to engagements outside the School, there are opportunities for pianists to be employed as accompanists in the teaching studios of the School. All arrangements of this kind must be approved and confirmed in Room 233. No arrangements will be considered valid until this condition has been met.

#### LIVING QUARTERS

Though Juilliard has no dormitories, the school keeps an up-to-date file of housing available in the neighborhood. This includes information on live-in arrangements with families, student rooming houses, "Ys," hotels, apartments and information about roommates. Visit Room 233.

#### GENERAL INFORMATION

The School keeps current college and school catalogs and information on summer study/work/travel opportunities in the United States and abroad. A large number of catalogs and pamphlets from Universities and Conservatories offering summer study in the performing arts abroad are kept for the use of students in Room 233.

## **CONCERTS**

Students at Juilliard have ample opportunity to attend concerts and other performances both at the School and throughout New York City.

#### AT JUILLIARD

Juilliard presents a variety of public performances, orchestra and choral concerts, opera, drama and dance productions, and chamber music and solo recitals. Most of these events are presented to Juilliard students, faculty, and the general public without charge. Soloists with orchestras, orchestra members, and students participating in chamber music concerts may secure tickets in the Concert Office two weeks before the date of the concert. Other students may secure tickets one week before the concert. For a few events tickets are distributed to the public on the basis of a contribution to the

Scholarship Fund; in many such cases, students and faculty are admitted without charge or attend a dress rehearsal.

#### IN NEW YORK

As the nation's major music, dance and drama center, New York offers ample opportunity to attend live performances. Many productions offer special student discounts through Juilliard and these discount tickets are distributed in the Concert Office. Room S-13, Street Level.

#### NEW YORK CITY OPERA

Attendance at certain rehearsals is possible for a limited number of students.

#### METROPOLITAN OPERA

Score desks for some performances of the Metropolitan Opera are available in Room S-13, Street Level at a nominal charge. Admission to dress rehearsals and certain other rehearsals is available to a limited number of students. Information may be had from the Concert Office.

#### NEW YORK PHILHARMONIC

Student discount coupons for the New York Philharmonic and other orchestra concerts are available in Room S-13, Street Level from 9:30 AM to 5:30 PM daily.

#### PERFORMANCE OPPORTUNITIES

As a School devoted to training professional performers, Juilliard offers as varied an opportunity as possible to its students to perform in the School and outside. The evening public concerts feature students in a variety of performances stemming from their instruction in School: orchestra, chorus, dance, opera and chamber music. A similar variety of performances is offered under School supervision at the Wednesday one o'clock concerts. For both series, the selection of students to perform and of repertory is determined upon recommendation of the faculty. If you wish to appear as a soloist or in ensemble, consult your major teacher or ensemble instructor. Application forms for these concerts are available in Room 222.

#### LINCOLN CENTER STUDENT PROGRAM

A limited number of professionally qualified Juilliard students and alumni appear in perform-

ance in junior and senior high schools in New York City, New York State and certain outlying areas under the auspices of the Lincoln Center Student Program. These performers are recommended to the Student Program office at Juilliard (Room 228) by the major faculty and are screened by an administrative reviewing committee. See page 18 for details of other performance opportunities.

#### STUDENT RECITALS

C. Michael Paul Hall on the first floor is available for full-length student recitals, including graduation recitals which are given priority in scheduling. Arrangements for such recitals, including reservations, preparation of programs, etc., must be made in Room S-13, Street Level, and applications must be approved by the major teacher. Only students graduating with a Master's or DMA degree may schedule recitals for the second semester before the Christmas vacation. All other students may schedule for the second semester only after the Christmas vacation. Generally speaking, these recitals are solo programs (with accompanist as needed), not ensemble programs and in no event may a musician who is not a registered student at Juilliard appear on a student recital, except for pianists who are studio accompanists registered through the Office of Student Services.

# GENERAL INFORMATION

The Information Desk on the second floor, in the Admissions Office area, keeps a current file of student and faculty addresses, and schedules. The Information Office also has copies of the catalog.

#### CHANGE OF ADDRESS

It is most important that the School have your correct local address. Any change of address or telephone number should be reported immediately to the Registrar's Office or Information Office.

#### SCHOOL NURSE

The services of a registered nurse are available from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM and from 2:00 PM to 4:00 PM, Monday through Saturday, in Room 203. The School also retains a Consulting Physician and a Psychologist. Appointments with the Consulting Physician or the Psychologist should be made through the Nurse's Office.

#### **HEALTH INSURANCE**

Through your registration for the 1977-78 School year, you are covered by a health insurance policy which covers all Regular Division students at the School. However, please note that the coverage provided is **very limited** and you should seriously consider supplementing it with a policy of your own. The coverage continues as long as you are registered as a student until June 15, 1978. Information forms for filing claims, and information relative to summer coverage may be obtained in Room 203.

#### PRACTICE ROOMS

Students registering for practice privileges may avail themselves of any practice room that is vacant. However, the School cannot guarantee that all students will be able to find rooms at any one particular hour of the day. No specific room or hours will be assigned to any one individual student.

No practice is permitted in classrooms unless scheduled through the Registrar's Office.

The following regulations governing the use of practice rooms will be strictly enforced:

- Food and beverages are not allowed in practice rooms.
- 2. The piano may not be moved under any circumstances.
- 3. If you must smoke, use ash tray provided.
- 4. Do not lay anything on the piano.
- Do not remove piano stools, benches, or chairs from the room.

#### **RECORDING STUDIO**

The School's Recording Studio in Room 319 is prepared to make disc or tape recordings for its students' own use and study. Recordings made with School facilities cannot be used or sold for commercial purposes, including radio broadcast.

The Recording Studio makes tape recordings of all Wednesday one o'clock and evening public concerts and programs for the School archives; participants in these concerts may obtain copies of these recordings at nominal rates. The Studio will also record student recitals at rates proportional to those for the use of the Studio. It is also possible to arrange for recordings to be made.

Mr. Henry Friend is in charge of the Recording Studio and should be consulted well in advance regarding arrangements, scheduling, and rates.

#### MUSIC REPRODUCTION

Arrangements for having music reproduced on the School's Bruning white printer can be made at the Registrar's Office. There is a nominal charge for copies and you should consult the Registrar's Office for advice in preparing your copy for printing.

#### **TEXTBOOKS**

All academic texts can be obtained in the Bookstore, Room S-13, Street Level.

#### CAFETERIA AND SNACK BAR

A Cafeteria is maintained on the second floor, offering a selection of sandwiches, soups, salads, desserts, cereals, drinks and vending machine snacks. No food or drink is allowed in any other area of the school.

The hours are 11:00 AM to 3:00 PM Monday through Saturday.

#### STUDENT LOUNGE

A lounge is maintained on the second floor; it is open from 9:00 AM to 10:00 PM Mondays through Fridays, Saturday, from 9:00 AM to 6:00 PM.

#### **PUBLICATIONS**

Special announcements concerning student or School activities will be distributed in the Student Lounge, from the Security Desk on the Entrance Floor and posted on Bulletin Boards.

The Juilliard News Bulletin is published during the School year and reports on activities of the School, its students, faculty, and alumni. Material may be submitted to the Concert Office or the Public Relations Office for consideration.

#### PUBLIC RELATIONS AND PUBLICITY

Wriston Lockair is Director of Public Relations and is in charge of all news concerning the School. His office is in Room 221.

#### CHECK ROOM

There is a checkroom located on the first floor near the elevators. These facilities are reserved for visitors to the School; students and faculty who do not have lockers or desk space; and for those enrolled in the Extension Division.

#### YOUR PROPERTY

Do not leave instruments, books, music, or other valuables unguarded in the building.

All thefts or lost and found items should be reported immediately to Mr. Bianchi, Manager, Building and Facilities in Room 214, or to 20th Precinct Headquarters: 678-1411. Students' property in the School building is there at the sole risk of the owner, and the School is not responsible for loss, theft or damage to such property for any cause. Students are advised to carry their own insurance on instruments and other valuables.

#### TELEPHONE CALLS

The School is not in a position to call students to the telephone or to deliver telephone messages. Exceptions will be made only in an extreme emergency. Students should not encourage their relatives or family to call the School. However, important messages will be taken and placed in the Student Mailboxes in the student lounge.

#### **ANNOUNCEMENTS**

All students should consult the official School bulletin boards regularly; these are located on each floor. These bulletin boards are reserved for official School announcements only.

Students may not post notices of concerts, meetings or any other communications in the elevators or on any wall or similar surface in the building. Such notices will be removed.

Student mailboxes are located in the student lounge on the second floor. Students should check these boxes daily for important telephone messages or messages from other students. Occasionally, to reach a student quickly, the administrative offices may also place a message in the box.

#### EMERGENCY VACATING OF BUILDING

City regulations require that warning gongs be installed throughout the building. If you hear the gongs, proceed at once to the nearest exit and do not re-enter the building until notified to do so.
