ALEXANDRE SCRIABIN

"... Scriabin ... Where does he come from? And who are his forebears?"

Igor Stravinsky

Alexandre Nikolaevich Scriabin, Russian composer born in Moscow, lived from 25 December, 1871 (7 January, 1872, new style of Russian calendar reckoning) to 14 April, 1915 (27 April, 1915). Now, nearly a century since his birth and half that from his death, there has been time enough for retrospective and perspective. When he was born Bruckner and Tchaikovsky were composing their second symphonies. By his demise, Stravinsky had written Rite of Spring, Webern Five Pieces for Orchestra, Ravel Daphnis and Chloë, and Sibelius, a Fifth Symphony. Scriabin himself had electrified the world. As a pianist composer Alexandre Scriabin has written many piano works and works for orchestra such as Poéme D'Extase and Prometheus, Poem of Fire. He toured Europe as a concert pianist including the cities of Paris, Berlin, Vienna, London and also New York City.

Evgeny Gunst announced in the first biography of Scriabin, "He was our greatest musical genious ever . . . He died at the beginning of the twentieth century, and with this the eclipse of Russian music begins."

Arthur Lourié spoke of the year 1908. "The most brilliant and prominent name in Russian music at that time was Alexandre Nikolaevich Scriabin. He was in the fullest sense the master of the minds of the younger Russian generation, and the idol of all who were in the front line of Russian culture."

"Scriabin was my god and idol . . . Lord what music it was! . . . crumbling and tumbling like a city under artillery fire . . . brimful of ideas minutely worked out to a point that was indistinguishable from frenzy, and at the same time as new as the forest, breathing life and freshness . . ."



He has been a ballet master for the City Center Joffrey Ballet and a faculty member of the American Ballet Center.

Mr. Zaraspe was the choreographic assistant and private teacher of Rudolf Nureyev for *Don Quixote* for the State Opera in Vienna. Later he worked on the film *I as a Dancer*. Mr. Zaraspe has taught Dame Margot Fonteyn and other major artists and has been a guest instructor at many congresses.

VICTORIA VERGARA was born and raised in Chile. She made her debut at the Teatro Municipal in Santiago. She has performed leading roles in *Il Tabarro* and *Fedora* with the New Jersey Opera Theater; and sang *Tosca* in a summer festival of the Philadelphia Lyric Opera. She sang the American premiere of *La Falce* by Catalani at the Newport Music Festival, has been a member of the American Opera Center since 1974, and sang the leading role of *Jenny* in the AOC world premiere of Hugo Weisgall's THE HUNDRED NIGHTS. She is a student of Rose Bampton. In tonight's performance she makes her New York debut as a dancer in the singing-dancing role of *Candelas*.

EL AMOR BRUJO

By MANUEL DE FALLA

Manuel de Falla wrote El Amor Brujo for Pastora Imperio, an Andalusian gypsy singer-dancer who played the principal role in the premiere in 1915. Since that performance only two singer-dancers have distinguished themselves in the dual role: La Argentina and La Argentinita, the latter of whom performed it in 1945. Since that time, it has not been given in its original version in New York. Tonight's performance re-creates the ballet as it was first conceived, to be both sung and danced by the same person. The story is as follows:

Candelas, a young, very beautiful and passionate woman, has loved a wicked, jealous, and dissolute, but fascinating and cajoling gypsy. Her memory of him is something like a hypnotic dream, a morbid, gruesome and maddening spell. She is terrified by the thought that the dead may not be entirely gone, that he may return, that he continues to love her in his fierce, shadowy, faithless and caressing way. She lets herself become a prey to her thoughts of the past, as if under the influence of a Spectre.

One night, overcome by her thoughts, she visits the Sorceress who warns her that her lover will soon be stabbed to death. Terrified she runs away to her cave and soon

after is confronted with the horrible vision predicted by the Sorceress.

Carmelo, a handsome youth, enamoured and gallant, loves Candelas, who, not unwilling to be won, cannot return his love because she is possessed by the spirit of her jealous lover.

The Sorceress (in accordance with Carmelo) decides to exert her power to liberate Candelas from the spell of her dead lover. She enacts the Ritual Fire Dance to exorcise the evil spirits with the participation of all neighbors and witches.

Carmelo realizes that Candelas still believes that the Spectre exists. Therefore he persuades Lucia, a young friend of Candelas (and also a past friend of the Spectre) to seduce him.

Carmelo returns to make love to Candelas and the Spectre intervenes but he finds

the charming Lucia who lures him and he cannot resist the temptation.

In the meantime Carmelo succeeds in convincing Candelas of his love. The lovers at last exchange the "Kiss of Love" that defeats the evil influence of the Spectre forever.

Ah! I know not what I feel nor what happens to me when I long for this accursed gypsy...

I am condemned to longing!
I am poisoned by love!
I am slain by sorrows! Ah! Ah!

The same as capricious fire,
just the same is love.
You fly away from it,
and it goes after you.
You call it, and it starts to run.
The same as capricious fire,
just the same is love.

Dance of the Game of Love.

The flirtation between Candélas' friend,
Lucía, and the philandering ghost is accompanied in part by words sung in
modo populare:
You are that evil gypsy
whom a gypsy girl once loved;
The love that she once gave you
you did not deserve! . . .
I am the voice of your destiny
I am the fire that burns you
I am the wind in which you sigh
I am the sea in which you sink.

Finale: The Bells of Morning.

Now day begins to dawn! Sing out, oh bells, sing out! For now my bliss soars.

ACT I

Tamino, a prince, is pursued by a furious monster. His life is saved by Three Ladies. After admiring his good looks as he lies unconscious they go off to tell their mistress, the Queen of The Night, about him. He recovers and meets Papageno, a bird-catcher, who claims that he was Tamino's rescuer. The Ladies re-enter; after locking up Papageno's mouth with a padlock as a punishment for lying, they give Tamino a portrait of Pamina, the Queen's daughter, with whom he at once falls in love. The Queen appears and bids him rescue Pamina, who is a prisoner in the hands of the High Priest Sarastro. The Ladies further say that Papageno is to go with him and that they will be directed by Three Boys; they give Tamino a magic flute, and a magic chime of bells to Papageno.

Pamina, having attempted to escape, is caught and brought back by Monostatos. Papageno enters; he and Monostatos are each frightened at the sight of the other and run away, but Papageno talks to Pamina and suggests that they should set off together in

search of Tamino.

Tamino meanwhile has been guided by the Three Boys to the temples of Nature, Reason and Wisdom. At the doors of the first two he is repulsed, but at the third he is met by the Speaker, who explains to him that Sarastro is not the cruel tyrant described by the Queen but the head of a brotherhood of wise and good men; he hints cryptically that Tamino may perhaps wish to join it. Tamino fails at first to understand; he can think only of Pamina who is still alive, he is told by an unseen chorus. The playing of the magic flute consoles him and wild creatures come to listen to it; hearing it answered by Papageno's panpipe, he goes to look for him. Papageno enters with Pamina, looking for Tamino, but they are intercepted by Monostatos and his slaves; Papageno starts to play on his bells

and Monostatos and the slaves are obliged to dance off.

Sarastro now enters with priests and people. Pamina throws herself at his feet and confesses her attempt to escape, but says that she did so to avoid the amorous advances of Monostatos, who now leads in Tamino and accuses him of trying to abduct Pamina. Tamino and Pamina see each other for the first time. Sarastro orders Monostatos to the basinado. Tamino and Papageno are led away for probation while Pamina remains in Sarastro's care.

ACT II

Sarastro prevails upon the priests to accept Tamino as a candidate for initiation into their mysteries. Tamino and Papageno are then subjected to their first trial, the test of silence; the Three Ladies appear and endeavor to make them speak, but they remain stead-

Monostatos, finding Pamina asleep, is on the point of assaulting her but is prevented by the sudden appearance of the Queen, who gives her a dagger and orders her to kill Sarastro. The Queen vanishes and Monostatos snatches the dagger from Pamina and threatens to kill her unless she yields to his desires. Sarastro enters, berates him and consoles Pamina.

Tamino and Papageno are subjected to a second test of silence. The Boys bring back the flute and bells; they also provide a generous meal which Papageno enjoys greedily.

Pamina enters, but neither of them will speak to her in spite of her distress.

The lovers are now brought before Sarastro, who says that Tamino must take his last farewell of Pamina. Tamino is led away. Papageno meanwhile makes it quite clear that the brotherhood is not for him and has a comic scene with an old woman, who for a moment

reveals herself as Papagena but is immediately sent away by the priest.

The Three Boys sing a hymn to the rising sun. Pamina enters in wild despair, intending to kill herself, but she is prevented by the Boys, who lead her gently away. Tamino is now subjected to the third trial and in this Pamina is allowed to join him. They pass unharmed through fire and water, protected by the sound of the magic flute, and are admitted to the company of the initiates. Papageno, still unable to find his Papagena, attempts to hang himself, but the Boys tell him to play on his bells, and while he does so they bring in Papagena with whom he is finally united.

The Queen, with Monostatos and the Ladies, makes a last attempt to destroy the temple but Sarastro appears, and they sink to eternal night while the chorus sings a hymn

of thanksgiving to Isis and Osiris.



Helen Hayes to Deliver Commencement Address

Miss Helen Hayes will be the guest speaker at this year's Academic Exercises on Friday, June 3, at 11 a.m. in Alice Tully Hall.

A preeminent figure in American theater, Miss Hayes has appeared in a wide range of dramatic works during her distinguished career including Dear Brutus, Caesar and Cleopatra, What Every Woman Knows, Mary of Scotland, Victoria Regina, Twelfth Night, The Glass Menagerie (in London), The Skin of Our Teeth and A Long Day's Journey into Night, among others. As early as 1932 she was named "best actress" by the Motion Picture Academy of Arts and Sciences for her role in The Sin of Madelon Claudet. She received an "Emmy" in 1954, the Antoinette Perry Award for best actress (Time Remembered) in 1958, and an Academy Award as best supporting actress (Airport) in 1971.

A member of the A.P.A. Phoenix Repertory Company since 1966, Miss Hayes is honorary president of the American Theatre Wing and president of the American National Theatre and Academy. She is the author of A Gift of Joy (1965), On Reflection (1968) and, with Anita Loos, Twice Over Lightly (1971).

Three Premieres Highlight Spring Dance Season

The Spring repertory season of the Juilliard Dance Division is scheduled for the Juilliard Theater on Saturday, May 7, Sunday, May 8 and Monday, May 9. The May 7 and 9 performances will be at 8:00 p.m., and the May 8 at 3:00 p.m.

Three premières will be offered during the season. Kazako Hirabayashi will choreograph a new dance to Bach's Concerto in D Minor, and a second new work to a score by Teo Macero. In addition to a revival of her dance Rooms, Anna Sokolow will do a new piece to Ernest Bloch's Voice in the Wilderness, in the original version for cello and piano. There will also be a revival of José Limón's Missa Brevis to the Kodaly score for chorus and organ. Abraham Kaplan will conduct the Kodaly and the balance of the programs will be conducted by Stephen Colvin.

Each program will include three of the above works.

Irwin Freundlich Dies at Age Sixty-Eight

Irwin Freundlich, a member of the Piano Faculty of the Juilliard School since 1936, died March 13 after a brief illness. A memorial service was conducted at the Riverside Chapel on March 16. Among those taking part were Peter Mennin, members of the Juilliard String Quartet, Dr. Richard Franko Goldman, Dr. Frederic Ewen, and Kenneth Wentworth.

Born in New York City in 1908, Mr. Freundlich had received his Diploma from the Institute of Musical Art. He studied with James Friskin and subsequently with Edward Steuermann. Later, with Mr. Friskin, he was to be co-author of *Music for the Piano*, a comprehensive manual of the keyboard repertoire from 1580-1952. At Juilliard he originated and developed the classes in piano repertory, beginning in 1941 and continuing through 1954.

Frequently sought out as a judge for major international competitions, he had been most recently one of the invited judges for the Liszt-Bartók Competition in Budapest. He had performed a similar role for the Naumburg Competition as well as Leventritt, the Munich in Germany, Busoni in Italy, the Enescu in Romania, the Montreal in Canada, the Van Cliburn in Texas, and many others.

In many parts of the United States Mr. Freundlich was invited to give master classes, and he would often present some of his former or current students. It was unusual for a season to pass without a Freundlich student receiving a major prize or important engagements with orchestras and series. With his wife Lillian, with whom he had performed many four-hand concerts and classes, he kept up a lively contact with literally hundreds of students both here and abroad. Included were Milton Salkind, president of the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, and his wife Peggy; Jean and Kenneth Wentworth, Diane Walsh, Gary Steigerwalt, Alan Marks, William Wolfram, Jon Hendrickson and Mack McCray.

Many tributes were received by Mrs. Freundlich from those who admired her husband as mentor, coach, colleague, teacher and friend.

OLEGNA FUSCHI gave a piano recital at Avery Fisher Hall on May 1, which included works by Bach, Haydn, Schumann, Chopin and Prokofiev.

SHIRLEY GIVENS gave a master class on violin techniques and pedagogy on February 14 at Yale University Graduate School of Music as guest of the Sanford Fellowship, and was invited to return to Yale in April to give a two-part seminar on string sight-reading.

Laurence Trott, piccolo virtuoso, included CHARLES JONES' Sonata Piccola on his program at CAMI Hall on February 20.

Members of the committee which awarded the Capezio Award to dancer Merce Cunningham included MARTHA HILL.

SUSANN McDonald appeared in her hometown of Rock Island, Illinois, with the Tri-City Symphony at Augustana Centennial Hall on February 11, 12 and 13. She performed the Gliere Concerto.

VINCENT PERSICHETTI was guest composer at the 14th annual Tennessee Tech University Composer Festival held on the Cookeville campus February 18 to 20. Mr. Persichetti took part in workshops and forums throughout the Festival, which included as participants some 800 high school students and their directors. Several programs of Mr. Persichetti's music were performed.

SYLVIA RABINOF of the Pre-College Faculty appeared as soloist in Liszt's Hungarian Fantasy and Beethoven's Choral Fantasy on March 6 with the Jersey State Symphony Orchestra and Chorus, conducted by Murray Glass. On March 28 she presented an improvisation workshop for the New England Pianoforte Teachers' Association in Boston.

ELIZABETH SMITH was dialect coach for the production of Peg O' My Heart by the Lion Theater Company in New York.

STANLEY SUSSMAN composed the music for the new dance work Nexus (choreography Buglisi), premiered by the Joyce Trisler Danscompany at the Riverside Church Theatre, February 3 to 6.







They'll Toe the Mark for Hector Zaraspe

Anyone having anything to do with dance will testify that choreographers, coaches, teachers and balletmasters are the elite of the ballet world.

Unknown to the public, except perhaps as names on printed programs, they are revered by dancers as instruments of discipline, knowledge and sensitivity, which even superstars admit they need for their own stability and reassurance.

The name of Hector Zaraspe, a 46-year-old Argentine teacher-coach in the dance department at the Juilliard School, is perhaps better known than others because of the unusual devotion that he inspires in his students. One of them is Dame Margot Fonteyn, who wrote about Zaraspe in her recent "Autobiography":

"When one thinks of approximately 300 hours of rigorous class each year, for 30 or 40 years of one's life, it is easy to appreciate that the teachers' personalities are immensely important. Those who love music, dancing and theater are easier to work for than those who care most about the placing of the hips but, of course, one cannot have one without the other, and all classes are absorbing. All the same, it is nice to laugh, and Hector has a delightful sense of humor to lighten the difficulties."

The qualities that have made Zaraspe famous on both sides of the Atlantic are present to some degree in many teachers, some of whom become more renowned than their students. Enrico Cecchetti (1850-1928), an Italian who taught in Russia before and after the Revolution, developed a pedagogy still handed down from teacher to teacher. Agrippina Vagonova (1879-1951), whose carrer was spent in Russia, is considered one of the most important teachers in ballet history. The system named after her is the basis of ballet education in Eastern Bloc countries and in many schools of the western world.

Among noteworthy teachers and coaches in this country whose names command respect are John Barker and David Howard, private teachers in Manhattan; Leon Danielian and Valentina Pereyaslavec of the American Ballet Theatre School; Benjamin Harkarvy of the Pennsylvania Ballet; Robert Joffrey of the Joffrey Ballet; Yurek Lazowski of the University of Utah, and Karel Shook of the Dance Theater of Harlem.

While there are hundreds of fine ballet teachers throughout the country, few arc considered great in their own time. The difference between good and great is the ability to guide the dancer to the heart of ballet and to enable the dancer to discover the inner meanings of the steps and the music.

Violette Verdy, a bailerina of the New York City Ballet who now is director of the Paris Opera Ballet, says of Zaraspe: "He gives you respect and kindness, and perspective and balance. He never loses sight of your humanity, and whatever he does he does with love so that you are able to reflect that love in the work you do. He opens up the roles he is teaching you, and he

shows you the heart and soul of the particular ballet. With him there is the joy of communication."

Patricia McBride of the company adds that Zaraspe probes and explores with the dancers he is coaching "the many different substances and qualities of a work. He has a great joy within him, and he knows the underlying feelings of the dance. I love his spirit. You know, dancers need direction and a sense of purpose. He gives that to us."

Zaraspe, normally a colorful, even flamboyant, man, turns shy when asked why he thinks he is so popular with dancers of many nations. "Is a very personal thing," he says in charming fractured English. "Dancers are like flowers. I love flowers. Some have beautiful perfumes; some, no. But all have something struggling to come out. I take them by the hand and try to bring them out.

"When you know music and your feeling is authentic, that is what dancers respect. Today, learning is not difficult, the technical side, that is. But if you don't have the spirituality, the aristocrat-ness, you cannot go out [on the stage]. Margot once said to me, 'Hector, I want to take class with you, because your class is very soft but very strong.'"

One of his present pupils at Juilliard says of him, "His is the velvet hand in the velvet glove." Rudolf Nureyev, who like Fonteyn often studies with Zaraspe, either individually or in regular class, whenever Nureyev is in New York, says much the same thing. Zaraspe is a close friend of both and

coached them in preparation for Nureyev's 1970 film, "I Am a Dancer."

Zaraspe freely admits he learns as much from his pupils as they from him, "I learned a lot from Rudy—his sensitivity to line and beauty. Rudy is my model. Margot, that exquisite lady, is my muse. Margot asked me last year if I thought she should now stop dancing. I told her, 'You're asking the wrong person. I do not come to see your developpe, your changement de jambe. For me to see you move one arm, to give, is beautiful. I can say, 'Thank God I saw this lady dance, because now I can teach my students what genius is and what is the true classical ballerina.'"

Zaraspe was born in Tucaman, Argentina, the youngest of seven children. At the age of 10 he began performing in school folk-dances in Buenos Aires. He took lessons in Spanish dance and modern dance before starting ballet training at 14. He danced with the opera ballet at the Teatro Colon, Buenos Aires, from 1949 to 1952, but then knew he lacked the "equipment" to be a premier danseur. His performing strengths, he says, were "sincerity, power and enormous conviction," and it was these qualities that he brought to teaching, a career that he embarked upon at the age of 21.

He taught and danced in Spain, and toured with the company of Antonio, from 1954 to 1964 when he arrived in New York with an introduction to Joffrey, who admired his work and engaged him as a teacher at the American Ballet Center.

Two years later, he gave private lessons to Nureyev in Vienna, where the Russian dancer was staging "Don Quixote," and subsequently helped Maya

Plisetskaya of the Bolshoi Ballet in the same work. He has since given private lessons to many famed American dancers and is responsible for the choreography in a number of films. Among screen stars who have worked with him are Ava Gardner and Mia Farrow. His most famous protege, completely trained by him, is Luis Fuentes, former principal dancer of the Joffrey Ballet, who now has his own company in Spain.

In 1971, Zaraspe was invited to Juilliard. It has been his home base ever since. He is in such demand that Juilliard permits him to take time off to accept assignments around the world. He has worked with the Dutch National Ballet, International Summer Academy of Dance in Cologne, Teatro Municipale in Rio de Janeiro, Metropolitan Opera, Hamburg State Opera, National Ballet of Canada, Teatro Colon and the Royal Academy of Dance in Capetown.

Zaraspe, a man of somewhat less than medium height, is an engaging personality. He is a snappy dresser, flashes a Jimmy Carter smile, wears his coal-black hair shoulder-length these days and gesticulates with abandon. Even in class, where discipline is the rule no matter who the teacher is, Zaraspe is not the sergeant-major that some of his colleagues are. He maintains order, and it is his will that prevails. But as some have observed, he does have a tart sense of humor and he does tease and banter, yet stops short of hectoring his pupils. "I try not to kill the personality, but to bring it out, to pull the artist out of the dancer. I enjoy seeing their development—like they were my own children."

All professional ballet dancers "take class," which is a euphemism for practicing and for limbering up—except that dancers find it unsatisfying to work alone. They crave instruction, assurance and correction when called for. Thus, wherever classes are held—and they are held at many places in the city nearly every day—there often may be a sprinkling of stars and superstars among the students, all doing the same ABCs.

Ballet class is a great leveler, with the teacher as supreme arbiter and authority. No matter how famous the dancer, he is merely another warm body so far as the teacher is concerned. Some teachers play God; some take out their hostilities in class; others try to be kind and still others are terrors, not above prodding or rapping students and stars alike with the batons or mallets or pointers they use to beat time with.

Great teachers approach the dance with reverence and elevate it above self, enlisting the dancer's support in service of art. This is Zaraspe's way, done so skillfully that few fail to respond to him.

Zaraspe's classes begin whenever the maestro chooses to saunter into the center of the studio. The talking and giggling among students stop with the suddenness of a shut door. Zaraspe devises a combination of steps in his head, then communicates the sequence to them in French, the language of ballet. They listen intently and almost always get it right the first time. An unseen signal passes to the piano accompanist and the music begins.

Zaraspe's voice seldom rises above
