



The only special requirements for auditions, said Mr. Rosen, are ability to play fairly well now, a serious interest in advanced study of the finest type of music and immediate registration at the Strand Theater for preliminary auditions, which will start on the Strand stage at 8:30 p.m. Thursday and continue nightly until the finals Tuesday night, Sept. 25.

The scholarship, for a year of study at Juilliard, is a memorial to George Gershwin, composer, whose life story is told in the Warner Brothers' film, "Rhapsody in Blue," which will open at the Strand Wednesday, Sept. 26.


