

THE SCENE OF THE ACTION IS IN EGYPT, 48 A. D.

Caesar, at the battle of Pharsala, has defeated the rebel Pompey.

Cornelia, wife of Pompey, and her son, Sextus, are treated kindly by Caesar, who promises forgiveness to Pompey.

Ptolemaeus, the Egyptian monarch, thinking to win favor with Caesar, has treacherously slain and beheaded Pompey.

Caesar is horrified at this outrage, and angrily dismisses the messengers of Ptolemaeus.

At a feast given in Caesar's honor by Ptolemaeus, the Romans scent treachery, and are on their guard.

Cleopatra, enamored of the heroic Caesar, seeks a meeting with him in her palace. Caesar obeys her wish, and during the meeting the palace is surrounded by the conspirators, who try to assassinate him. Cleopatra attempts to stem the plotters. Caesar escapes, leaping from the palace walls into the sea, and is thought to have perished. He swims to safety, however, and later learns from Sextus the way to gain help and the secret passage into the fort, where Cornelia and Cleopatra are held captive by Ptolemaeus.

Caesar triumphs and rescues Cornelia and Cleopatra. Sextus has avenged his father and slain the crafty Ptolemaeus.

The opera ends with the crowning of Cleopatra by Caesar, who hails her as ruler of Egypt.
