Curtain Rises on Performance Season

The Juilliard performance season officially opens on Wednesday, September 25, at 9 PM in Paul Hall, with a program featuring pianists Avner Arad, Myra Choi, and Adrian Oetiker, winners of the 1991 Gina Bachauer International Piano Competition at Juilliard. Radio station WQXR-AM/FM, hosted by Robert Sherman, will broadcast the concert live as the year's first McGraw-Hill Young Artists Showcase.

The Juilliard Symphony begins its season on Friday, September 27 in the Juilliard Theater. Director of orchestral studies, Otto-Werner Mueller, will conduct a performance of Rossini's La gazza ladra, Tchaikovsky's Concerto in D Major for Violin and Orchestra, Op. 35, and Beethoven's Symphony No. 5 in C Minor, Op. 67. On Friday, October 25, in conjunction with Lincoln Center's Mozart Bicentennial, the Symphony will be joined by the Barnard-Columbia Chorus in a special program of Mozart works, conducted by Joseph Flummerfelt in Alice Tully Hall. Also in October, as a special addition to this year's orchestral series, The Juilliard Wind Ensemble will make its debut

performing twentieth-century works by Janacek, Stravinsky, Persichetti, Copland and Schuman.

The Juilliard Orchestra returns to Avery Fisher Hall Wednesday, October 2, for its sixth season of Lawrence A. Wien Concerts. Guest conductor James De Preist will lead the Orchestra in the first of four Avery Fisher Hall concerts with a program featuring Mahler's Symphony No. 9 and Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 22. On Wednesday, November 13, Richard Bradshaw will conduct the Orchestra in presenting works by Bloch, Siegfried Matthus and Elgar. In January 27 Andre Previn will conduct the Orchestra in a New York premiere performance of Stephen Stucky's Son et lumiere (1988). Also on the program are Chopin's Concerto No. 1 and Prokofiev's Symphony No. 5. Otto-Werner Mueller, will lead the Orchestra in the final Wien concert of the season on Wednesday, April 8, in a program featuring Strauss' Don Juan, Op. 20 and Concerto No. 1 in E-Flat Major for Horn and Orchestra, and Brahms' Symphony No. 4.

Surprise! Juilliard has a new entrance. a chance to beckon people inside. Next to It opened to greet new students on August the Bookstore is the office of the Evening 26. On that day, the 66th Street doors Division, opening directly onto the entrance were locked, and Nora, guardian of the gates these forty years, took up her new perch in the grand lobby on the plaza level above 65th street. Now she watches over no darkened cavern but an expansive, bright, welcoming space looking toward Lincoln Center. At last, after more than twenty years in this place, Juilliard truly shares the Lincoln Center campus. The sunny plaza spanning 65th Street leading to the Beaumont Theater, The Metropolitan Opera, The New York State Theater and Avery Fisher Hall is our front yard.

You will also have noticed that the entrance lobby is not the only novelty to greet you as you arrived at the door. The Juilliard Bookstore has been reborn. Once crowded and cramped, it now stretches along the promenade from the top of the stairs above Tully Hall Westward toward the School's new entrance. Broad windows put the Bookstore's wares on clear display, inviting students and passers-by to browse, and giving manager Keith Hardin lobby

Directly across the lobby from the Evening Division is the doorway to the Admissions Office. Although Carole Everett and the Admissions staff were sorry to leave the cosy home they shared with various species of insect life on the loading dock at 66th street, they will settle into their capacious new quarters once they adapt to an environment in which they need not climb over desks and fall over each other.



New Artist-Teachers Join Faculty



John Corigliano

John Corigliano (Composition) is one of America's most prominent composers of today. Raised by a concertmaster of the New York Philharmonic for twenty-three years and an accomplished pianist, Mr. Corigliano continues to demonstrate the musical genius of his family. His compositions have been commissioned by orchestras throughout the United States, including the Chicago, Minnesota, American and Boston Symphonies, and the New York Philharmonic. In December, Mr. Corigliano's recently completed opera The Ghosts of Versailles will have its world premiere with the Metropolitan Opera. Honors and awards from the National Endowment for the Arts, Guggenheim Foundation, and the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters, as well as nominations for Emmy, Grammy, and Academy Awards are among other prestigious accolades he has received. Mr. Corigliano was a composition student of Otto Luening at Columbia University and Victor Giannini at the Manhattan school of Music, where he later served on the faculty. Currently he is a professor of music at Lehman College.




Cho-Liang Lin

Cho-Liang Lin (Violin), an alumnus of Juillard, began his professional career in 1977, when he was named first prize winner in the Queen Sofia International Violin Competition. A native of Taiwan, Mr. Lin enrolled at The Juilliard School in 1975, entering the school's Pre-College Division as a student of Dorothy DeLay. Beginning with his days at Juilliard where he was concertmaster of the orchestra, Mr. Lin has distinguished himself with many prestigious prizes, worldwide recitals with Isaac Stern and Andre-Michel Schub and performances with over eighty orchestras including the Chicago, Cleveland, and Boston Symhonies, New York Philharmonic, London Symphony and Concertgebouw Orchestra. He has received recording awards such as the Stereo Review Record of the Year and Gramaphone Critics' Choice citations and in 1977 he performed as a soloist at President Carter's Inauguration Day concert. Mr. Lin has also presented master classes at the Aspen Music Festival for the past two summers.

Susan Harp joins the Drama Division as Production Stage Manager. She has an MFA in Stage Management from the University of Missouri--Kansas City where she stage managed several shows for the Missouri Repertory Theatre. This past summer she worked as a Stage Manager for the Chuatauqua Institute.

Darryl Quinton (Drama) will teach movement to the first-year Drama students as well as conduct a Jazz class for the third-year students. He holds a BFA from Howard University in Theater Arts and is currently a member of the Dance Theater of Harlem where he is a choreographer, an instructor of ballet and jazz, as well as a performer. He is also a ballet instructor at Joy of Movement and Arts Connection in New York City.

Rohan De Silva (Piano) has performed as a chamber musician and soloist in major arts centers and festivals, both in his native Sri Lanka and throughout the world. Most recently he toured the U.S. with the illustrious violinists Itzhak Perlman and Cho-Liang Lin, both of whom engaged him for the 1990-91 season. He has become a favorite collaborative artist of the new generation of young violin virtuosos Joshua Bell, Benny Kim, Anne Akiko Meyers, Gil Shaham, and Kyoko Takazawa, and recently he appeared with Midori on The Tonight Show. Frequent collaborations with these outstanding artists have led De Silva to highly acclaimed performances in prestigious concert halls including Carnegie Hall, The Kennedy Center, Alice Tully Hall, La Scala in Milan and Concertgebouw in Amsterdam. He is an alumnus of Juilliard where he studied with Martin Canin and Felix Galimir, while working closely with Dorothy DeLay. In 1990, Mr. De Silva was awarded a special prize as Best Accompanist at the Ninth International Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow. In addition, he has recorded for Deutsche Grammophon and CBS/Sony Classical. Forthcoming is a 1992 Spring release of his recording with Collins Classics in London and a future recording with Anne Meyers for RCA.

Letitia Coburn

Letitia Coburn (Dance) earned her BFA from SUNY Purchase and an MA from CCNY. She is certified as a Labanotation teacher and reconstructor and has taught at City College of New York and St. Joseph's College. Ms. Coburn directed and reconstructed works for various schools including Dickinson College and Franklin and Marshall College. She set and directed Doris Humphrey's Day on Earth for the Juilliard Dance Ensemble's spring 1990 season, which was also performed on tour with Juilliard's Performing Arts Program for Schools. As a performer, Ms. Coburn danced in works by Isadora Duncan, Charles Weidman, Doris Humphrey and Jose Limon with numerous companies, including the American Dance Festival.



Jerome Lowenthal (Piano) performed the New York premiere of Liszt's newly discovered Third Piano Concerto this past January with Zubin Mehta and the New York Philharmonic. Along with this honor he previously presented the world premiere or Rorem's Piano Concerto in Six Movements with the Pittsburgh Symphony and has appeared with leading American orchestras including the Phildelphia Orchestra, the Chicago Symphony and the Boston Symphony. A former resident of Jerusalem, Mr. Lowenthal was concertlecturer at the Jerusalem Academy and an annual performer with the Israel Philharmonic. As a chamber musician, Mr. Lowenthal has played duo recitals with cellist Nathaniel Rosen and violinist Itzhak Perlman, as well as concerts with the late Israeli pianist Ronit Amir, who was his wife. With the London Symphony and Sergiu Commissiona, Mr. Lowenthal has recorded the complete works of Tchaikovsky for piano and orchestra. He regularly participates in festivals including the Reizand Muziekgezelschap in Holland, Chamber Music of Los Angeles, the Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara and the Sitka Summer Music Festival in Alaska. Mr. Lowenthal studied with William Kappell, Edward Steuermann at Juilliard and Alfred Cortet at the Ecole Normale de Musique.

John D. Rojak (Bass Trombone) is the newest member of the American Brass Quintet. He received his Bachelor of Music degree from The Juilliard School where he studied with Don Harwood. He also studied with John Coffey, David Taylor, and Sam Pilafian. Mr. Rojak has performed with the Orchestra of St. Luke's, the New York Chamber Symphony, Stamford Symphony, Manhattan Philharmonic, New York City Symphony, and was a founding member of the New Amsterdam Brass. He is solo bass trombonist in the Broadway musical "Les Miserables," frequently plays for studio recordings, and has performed with the big bands of Mel Lewis, Bob Mintzer and Gerry Mulligan.

Paul Sutherland (Dance) began his career relatively late, at eighteen, after seeing his first ballet, Agnes de Mille's Rodeo. Three years later he joined the American Ballet Theatre and Rodeo was one of the first ballets he danced there. Mr. Sutherland became a principle dancer with ABT, and Harkness Ballet and the Joffrey Ballet, performing a wide variety of classical and contemporary roles. He has danced throughout the United States and Canada, in almost every European country as well as the Middle East, India, Afghanistan, South America and the Soviet Union. As Ms. de Mille's assistant he has staged Rodeo numerous times in the U.S. and Belgium, and has staged her dramatic masterpiece Fall River Legend for the Boston Ballet. Since retiring he has been Ballet Master of the Joffrey Ballet, the Feld Ballet, the Milwaukee Ballet and is now with the New Jersey Ballet.

Chris Hanna, has been a Drama Division Guest Director for the last two years at Juilliard where he directed two second-Prior to Juilliard, Mr. year projects. Hanna was artistic director of the Virginia Stage Company.

Peter Schoettler (French Horn) joins the Pre-College Division. He holds both Bachelors and Masters degrees from The Juilliard School and has studied french horn with Julie Landsman, John Cerminaro, Robert Fries, and Alan DeMattia. While at Juilliard, he toured Norway with the Juilliard Brass Ensemble, appeared on ABC and CBS television, and was a teaching fellow in the Music Division. In 1990 he played in a series of special events, for which he frequently arranged the music, including Nelson Mandela's arrival in New York, the presentation of Columbia University's honorary Doctorate to the President of Czechoslovakia, Vaclav Havel, and the opening ceremonies of Ellis Island. A member of the Cardinal Brass Quintet, Mr. Schoettler has taught at the Tidewater Music Festival and is currently the Music Administration Coordinator with the New York Philharmonic.


Ms. Kenney is married to Mr. Modesto




Clifford Shulman

Clifford Shulman (Dance) has danced with numerous companies in New York including Daniel Lewis Dance, Pearl Lang Dance Company, Mary Anthony Dance Theater, and American Contemporary Dance Theater, performing leading roles by pioneer choreographers Doris Humphrey, Charles Weidman, Jose Limon and Anna Sokolow. Heisdirector of his own solo-due trepertory program, Clifford Shulman Dance Repertory. His choreography has been presented at the Riverside Dance Festival and other performance spaces throughout the United States. Mr. Shulmanhasservedonthefacultiesofmany schools, both in the U.S. and Mexico, including the Jose Limon Dance Center, Lincoln Center Institute, and The State School in Mexico City.

Thompson Hanks, Jr. (Tuba), who joins the Pre-College Division, studied at the Eastman School of Music and Lamar State. He studied with Donald Knaub, Richard Burkhart, and Arnold Jacobs. Mr. Hanks is a member of the New York Brass Quintet and the New York City Ballet Orchestra as well as the Chautauqua and American Composers Orchestras. He is a founding member of the New York Tuba Quartet and a former member of the San Antonio, Puerto Rico, and Minneapolis Symphonies. Mr. Hanks is currently a faculty member at the New England Conservatory, the Manhattan School of Music and Yale.

Ray Cook (Dance), a leading expert in Labanotation, has demonstrated his versatility as a reconstructor, choreographer, director, teacher, author, as well performer. Over the past thirty years he has staged, directed, and notated works by Jose Limon, George Ballanchine, Ninjinska, Doris Humphrey and other esteemed choreographers, for eighteen companies across the United States and abroad. He is author/publisher/editor of more than two dozen publications on dance theme and variations, labanotation, and reconstruction, with nine more forthcoming. An alumnus of Juilliard, Mr. Cook returns to work with advanced labanotation students on The Humphrey Project: a reconstruction and notation of Doris Humphrey's Ruins and Visions. Last performed in the late 1950's, the work will be presented on stage by



members of the Juilliard Dance Ensemble in Spring 1991. Mr. Cook has been a teacher at sixteen dance companies, colleges and universities. Currently he is a faculty member at Vassar College.

Carolyn Monka Serota (Drama) joins Juilliard as a teacher of the Alexander Technique. Since obtaining a B.A. from Bryn Mawr College, she has worked in the fitness and body therapy fields, designing and teaching exercise/movement programs--Fitness for You--for private students and groups. In 1987 she became certified to teach the Alexander Technique and in January 1989, she joined the faculty of the American Center for the Alexander Technique as an associate teacher.



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1991-1992 Scholarship and Award Update

Both alumni and friends of the School have generously provided new scholarships for 1991-1992. The following are awards available for the first time this year:

The Estate of W. Harold Alderman has funded the Ann S. Alderman & W. Harold Alderman RDA Scholarship to assist music students. The Aldermans were known as lovers of music and had a commitment to young artists.

The Annette and Frank Berlin Memorial Scholarship was created by Mrs. Martin A. Stuchiner in memory of her parents. The Berlins were Juilliard Association members who derived much pleasure from attending Juilliard Concerts. The scholarship has been designated for piano students, and will be available for three years.

A bequest from the Estate of Carl Cloe has donated the Rhea Cloe and Carl Cloe Memorial Fund providing financial assistance to gifted young artists from the states of Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas and Colorado. Mr. Cloe, an investment banker in New York, was born and raised in Iowa. Growing up, he studied the piano and often competed for state music prizes.

Sol Greitzer came to Juilliard in 1943 on a Fellowship in violin and studied with Louis Persinger. He went on to become a principle violist with the New York Philharmonic. He was a devoted and long time friend of the School. In his memory, his wife Shirley has established The Sol Greitzer Memorial Scholarship for Strings to be awarded annually.

Gertrude Grunin, a Juilliard Association member, and her husband Morris Grunin have established two new scholarships. The Gertrude and Morris Grunin Prize is to be awarded annually to one student pianist, cellist, or violinist. In memory of Mrs. Grunin's parents, the Gertrude and Morris Grunin Prize in Voice in Memory of Augusta and Isidore Kolberg will benefit one voice student each year.

The Bertha Levin Scholarship will fund an annual award for students of Piano and Voice. Established by Mr. A. Anshell, executor of the Nina Anshell Estate, the scholarship has been given in memory of Mrs. Anshell's mother, Bertha Levin.

The friends and family of Lily Mehlman Rady have started the <u>Lily Mehlman Rady Memorial Scholarship</u> in her honor. The scholarship will benefit one dance student per year.

Renowned pianist and former Juilliard faculty member Alexander Siloti, will be memorialized through the <u>Alexander Siloti Scholarship Fund</u> for Juilliard piano students. Born in Russia Mr. Siloti studied with many famous teachers including Tchaikovsky, and Liszt. He became a professor of piano at the Moscow Conservatory, and taught at Juilliard from 1924 until 1942.

A bequest from the Estate of Arlene Spiro funded the Arlene Spiro Memorial Scholarship. The fund will provide scholarships to promising young artists who are visually impaired. Ms. Spiro was an alumna of Juilliard.

After a six year fellowship at Juilliard, Evelyn Spitalny became the concertmaster of the Phil Spitalny All-Girl Orchestra, where she also met and married her husband, Phil Spitalny. The Estate of Evelyn Klein Spitalny has established The Evelyn & Phil Spitalny Scholarship for one female violinist and one male conductor with great appreciation and everlasting gratitude to Juilliard.

For the benefit of promising cello students, Mrs. Elfriede Stonzek has established the Morris & Elfriede Stonzek Memorial Scholarship. The scholarship is to be awarded annually.

Donald Green and friends have donated <u>The William Vacchiano Award in Trumpet</u>. Mr. Vacchiano has been on the Juilliard faculty since 1935. As a former student, Mr. Green donated the award, to be given annually, as a token of his appreciation and respect for Mr. Vacchiano's guidance.

A bequest from the trust of Erik Walz has established <u>The Erik Walz Scholarship</u> to be awarded annuli. Mr. Walz was a long time Juilliard Association member.

For aspiring violinists who are residents of San Diego County, California, The Trust of Alfred Williams, Jr. has endowed The Alfred Williams, Jr. Scholarship in Violin.

Pre-College Scholarships

Family, friends, and colleagues of Leonard Eisner are honoring his memory with the <u>Leonard Eisner Scholarship</u> for pre-college piano students. Mr. Eisner was an alumnus of Juilliard and a beloved member of the pre-college faculty since 1959.

In celebration of her ninetieth birthday, the family and friends of Clara Collens have named the <u>Collens Pre-College Violin Scholarship</u>. Ms. Collens is an alumna of Juilliard as well as a former faculty member. This scholarship will assist precollege students for three years.

In memory of his father, a Juilliard alumnus, film director Francis Ford Coppola and friends, have established the <u>Carmine Coppola Scholarship</u> for pre-college students. Carmine Coppola played first flute in several city symphonies before joining the NBC Symphony Orchestra in 1951. In 1974 he won an Academy Award for best original score for "The Godfather, Part II." He was nominated again this past year for best-song from the movie "The Godfather, Part III."

Bachauer Winners

Four Juilliard pianists, Avner Arad, Adrian Oetiker, Mikhail Yanovitsky, and Myra Choi, have been selected as winners in the 1991 Gina Bachauer International Piano Competition at Juilliard. All four were awarded full scholarships to The Juilliard School for the 1991-92 academic year, and Mr. Arad and Mr. Oetiker were also awarded additional stipends for living expenses.

A joint recital featuring the Bachauer competition winners will open Juilliard's performance season on Wednesday, September 25, at 9PM, and will be broadcast live on radio station WQXR-AM and FM from Juilliard's Paul Recital Hall. Traditionally, it is the first program of each season's McGraw-Hill Young Artists Showcase series presented on WQXR and hosted by Robert Sherman. Mr. Arad, Mr. Oetiker and Ms. Choi will perform their concert selections. Although tickets are needed, the performance is free and the public is invited to attend.

Avner Arad, a twenty-four year old native of Haifa, Israel, begins his second year in the Master of Music Program at Juilliard, as a student of Rudolf Firkusny. Adrian Oetiker, 23, from Saint Gallen, Switzerland, formerly studied piano and violin at the Zurich Conservatory. He enters Juilliard this fall, studying with Bella Davidovich in the Advanced Certificate Program. Mikhail Yanovitsky, 26, selected earlier this year as a Young Concert Artist, comes to Juilliard from Leningrad, U.S.S.R. with a bachelor and a masters degree from the Tchaikovsky Conservatory in Moscow. This fall he begins the Professional Studies Program as a student of Seymour Lipkin. Myra Choi, 14, from Northridge, California, returns to Juilliard to begin her third year in the Pre-College Division, under the tutelage of Katherine Parker.

The Bachauer Competition jury was comprised of Juilliard piano faculty members Martin Canin, Seymour Lipkin, Josef Raieff, Gyorgy Sandor, and Oxana Yablonskaya.

Joining the jury were special guest jurors Louis Jean Brunelli, Lilian Kallir, and Andre-Michel Schub.

The Gina Bachauer Scholarship Fund for gifted young pianists was established in 1979 through a bequest from Mrs. Lillian Rogers of New Orleans. Mrs. Rogers had been a lifelong friend of Mme. Bachauer who died in 1976.

Harpsichord Commissioned For Juilliard

Music publisher Harry Goodman recently donated a custom-built harpsichord to The Juilliard School. The double manual instrument was constructed by Bruce Kennedy in Amsterdam. Built in the 17th-century Flemish-style, the soundboard is

The orchestral season will conclude on May 21 with the Juilliard Orchestra, again under the baton of Otto-Werener Mueller, performing Weber's Overture to Oberon, Beethoven's Concerto No. 3 in C. Minor, and Rimsky-Korsakov's Scheherazade.

In a very special event, tenor Luciano Pavorotti will return to Juilliard to present a master class with Young Artists from the Opera Center on Wednesday, October 30, and Thursday, October 31, 4 to 6:30 PM, in the Juilliard Theater. Mr. Pavarotti's previous classes were presented in 1979 and 1987.

The Juilliard Opera Center will open its season of all-twentieth-century works on Wednesday, December 11 with Samuel Barber's *Vanessa*, conducted by Richard Bradshaw. Edward Berkeley will direct the production.

On February 26, the Opera Center will present arias and scenes from Leonard Bernstein's Mass, Shostakovich's Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk, Op. 29, Marc Blitzstein's Regina, William Walton's first opera Troilus and Cressida, Jerome Kern's Sweet Adeline, Lee Hoiby's Summer and Smoke, and Kurt Weill's 'Broadway opera' Street Scene. Conductor Hall France will lead the Juilliard Opera Orchestra in this program which will also include Prokofiev's Orchestral Interlude from Fiery Angel, Op. 37, and will be directed by the Opera center's artistic advisor Frank Corsaro.



In April, the Opera Center concludes its season with a unique double-bill of Poulenc's opera-bouffe Les Mamelles de Tiresias and a New York premiere of Delius's last opera Fennimore and Gerda.

The annual FOCUS! festival of twentiethcentury music in January will concentrate on music of the 1980's and will include an eightieth birthday tribute to composer John Cage.

In November, The Juilliard Dance Division will present world premieres by Garth Fagan, Diane Coburn and Lynn Wimmer, set to an all-Mozart program. In addition to these world premieres, there will be *Night Dances* by alumna Lisa Nowak, set to the *D Major Divertimento*, and Joan Woodbury's *Affectionate Infirmities*, set to Eine kleine Nachtmusik.

The April Dance concert series will feature three masterworks of modern dance and a world premiere by Benjamin Harkarvy. Members of the Juilliard Dance Ensemble will also perform Doris Humphrey's *Ruins and Visions*, as reconstructed by alumnus and Dance faculty member Ray Cook.

The graduating class of the Drama Division will open its season in the fall with an ambitious production of Shakespeare's Love's Labor's Lost, directed by Michael Langham. This will be followed in the Winter by a performance of Cecil B. Taylor's And a Nightingael Song, directed by Eve Shapiro. Two other fourth-year plays are to be chosen. Highlighting the third-year class presentations will be the premiere performance of a work by Juilliard playwright-in-residence Tony Kushner.

Capping Juilliard's performance season will be a post-commencement trip to the Evian festival in France by the Juilliard Orchestra.

The Hampton String Quartet, whose members are violinists REGIS IANDIORIO ('68 BM) and RICHARD HENRICKSON ('72 BS, '73 MM), violist RICHARD MAXIMOFF ('74 BM, '75 MM), and cellist JOHN REED - gave their American solo recital debut in May to inaugurate a new concert series at the Burgdorff Cultural Center Theater in New Jersey. The ensemble gave their British debut in September at London's Queen Elizabeth Hall and returned to London in December to perform a concert at the Bloomsbury Theatre, which was also taped by the BBC's GLR Radio for broadcast. In July, he made a return appearance on the Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concert Series in Chicago, and in August, he was guest soloist with the Elkhorn Symphony at the Elkhorn Music Festival.

Pianist PETER HOWARD ('48 BS) was one of several of both past and present Juilliard students to participate in a concert given by New Music for Young Ensembles in April. He performed works by Dick Hyman with soprano Marni Nixon and pieces from his own *Portfolio of Rags* in a concert dedicated to the memory of longtime Juilliard voice faculty member Eleanor Steber. Noted as a Broadway conductor and arranger, he most recently supplied the dance arrangements for Liza Minnelli's most recent show at Radio City Music Hall.

Harvard University has awarded conductor ISAIAH JACKSON ('69 MS, '73 DMA) the medal for Achievement in the Arts from the Signet Society. Jackson, Harvard class of 1966, joins an illustrious group of recipients which includes T.S. Eliot, Robert Frost and Robert Lowell. This past summer, Mr. Jackson made his symphonic conducting debut in Australia with a seven-week tour sponsored by the Australian Broadcasting Corporation.

DAVID KAISERMAN (Piano, '59 BS, '60 MS), Professor of Piano at Northwestern University, presented a recital and master class at the University of Missouri--Kansas City in February and a lecture/recital on the piano music of Sergei Liapunov at Western Illinois University in March.

Bassoonist JEFF KEESECKER ('85 MM) has been appointed Professor of Bassoon at the Florida State University School of Music. He will be leaving behind his post with the Florida Orchestra and a six-year stint as Professor of Bassoon at the University of South Florida. He has been a member of the Florida and Ars Nova Wind Quintets, and summers is bassoonist with the Swannanoa, North Carolina Chamber Festival near Asheville.

In Detroit, violinist LAURA KOBAYASHI ('85 BM) appeared in a recital series at the Detroit Institute of Arts in April. Her program consisted of the works of Mozart, Ravel and Tchaikovsky. Ms. Kobayashi has also been recently appointed Assistant Professor of Violin at University of Georgia for the 1991-92 academic year. As a result she will take a leave of absence from her doctoral studies at the University of Michigan.

On April 30, pianist **RITA CHEN KUO** (Dip '67, '68 PGD) was guest soloist with the Taipei City Symphony, performing Schumann's Piano Concerto in A Minor.
