Address of Presentation by Dr. Damrosch.

"We have a young fellow on our faculty who claims to have arrived at years of discretion, when we all know that he is as frisky a lad as he ever was and just as full of the old Nick.

"However, he has decided to retire to a quiet pasture in New Hampshire, eat grass, and chew the cud of reminiscence of a glorious past, leaving us to labor in the sweat of our brows.

"Shall we submit tamely to such treatment? Alas, what can we do? A wilfu' mon maun hae his way. -- But take care, Percy boy, you shall not throw us overboard and cast us in the scrap basket of oblivion.

"We understand that our trustees have appointed you a life member of the Faculty Council. That is a string by which we can hold you; but in addition we want to make sure that you will think of us every day of your life and, as much of your time will no doubt be spent at your desk, your colleagues are giving you these utensils to remind you of us who love, respect, and admire you, and who wish you and all your family happiness and prosperity. (Presents bronze desk set.)

"The seed you have sown and which has already developed into such a fine plant will continue to flourish maintaining the Goetschius spirit and the Goetschius ideals until long after you and I shall have gone to make music elsewhere."

Response by Dr. Goetschius

"How can I thank you all adequately, for this kind and generous manifestation?

"In the class room, when teaching our boys and girls some of the principles of good musical Form, we lay great stress upon the law of variety and contrast; for that is the law of life itself. So, as the eternal pendulum swings, we pass from a condition of joy to one of sorrow, and then back again. I have had twenty years of very great joy in this school, and must now pass to the real sorrow of parting; but that will soon be followed by a period of happiness again, filled with most pleasant memories of what I have known and done and enjoyed here.

"I feel that I owe you all a debt of gratitude. I owe it to my pupils for their unwavering loyalty, and their ofttimes very necessary patience with a testy old teacher.

"My heartfelt thanks are due, also, to the members of our Faculty, past and present; they have always shown such sympathy and such genuine recognition and cooperation.

"And to our dear Director I owe a great debt of gratitude, as indeed we all do. I wonder, sometimes, if we all quite realize just what we owe to Brother Frank! It is well enough for each one of us teachers to be signally efficient, each an expert in his or her

branch of instruction; it is fine to have gained facility and the ability to do great things; but of what use is it, if we have no opportunity of applying our skill? Like a student in some horticultural school, who has become fully equipped, a true expert, in all matters of gardening -- what good will it be to him or others if he has no garden to work in? We must have a place to work -- and there is one here tonight who has been instrumental in creating a place wherein we can make use of the efficiency that we surely possess, and of which we are justly proud; this is what our dear Director has done for us, and for which we all owe him our fervent gratitude.

"And then -- I do not know what to say to our Board of Trustees. They have always manifested such a noble, generous, helpful attitude, have always shown true sympathy and encouragement. Well, what is the use of talking! I thank you all from the bottom of my heart. I shall never forget you. I am grateful, and proud too, for your permission that I may consider myself always a part of the Institute and its Faculty Council. I trust you will call upon me if an emergency should arise. I hope it will!"

Graduates:

The twenty years since the Institute of Musical Art was established have passed so quickly to us who were present at its birth that we can scarcely realize the long stretch of years which have elapsed. It is only when we look at the long list of graduates and the splendid roll of honor of the names of artists, composers and teachers who carry the Institute's banner throughout our land, yes, and through every continent on the globe, that we are conscious that such results could not have been attained but after long effort, and we can feel that the cooperative efforts of our excellent staff of teachers have borne good fruit.

It was not mere chance which gave to our school its name. We wanted to indicate that this was not to be a trade school in which young men were to be turned into little piano teachers, fiddlers, movie organists and church choir singers as quickly as possible; but rather to develop good, all-round musicians first and then to give to those who were sufficiently gifted by nature every opportunity to fit themselves for an honorable career in music.

Therefore we planned our courses so that they would be a schooling in the <u>Art</u> of Music; we erected a noble building as a background to the musical atmosphere which is needed for the inspiration of the student; we proAddress by Mr. Damrosch - continued

vided libraries, lectures, recitals and concerts, ensembles of chamber music, orchestra practice and recently even classes for the study of kindred arts at the Metropolitan Museum. It would take too long to describe all the advantages the Institute offers its students but I hope that our graduates will always demonstrate that the training the Institute has given them has made of them better men and women, better musicians and truer artists than they would have been after the shorter, one-sided training which the average private teacher could have given them.

Our main object, then, is not to make you wage earners, but to make you realize, through intelligent study and thorough understanding, the infinite beauty of the art of music and to make you worthy of devoting your service to this art.

Whether you serve her as teacher, performer, composer or amateur is immaterial so long as you are faithful to the ideals which must animate the true disciple of music.

The following brief paragraphs may prove of some help to you as a guide to conduct and action -

That Art is the $\underline{\text{beautiful}}$ expression of ideal thought and of all human emotions.

That virtuosity, i. e., supreme skill, is not art but only its handmaiden.

Address by Mr. Damrosch - continued

That true art is true religion, for it leads the spirit into higher and nobler realms of thought and feeling.

Don't imitate the pianola or any other form of canned music; rather express yourself in your own way, however simply, and you may achieve artistship.

Don't degrade music to the level of the "job". Let it be the giving forth of your spirit, the true utterance of your innermost self; your prayer of devotion to noble achievement in the morning, your hymn of praise at noon and your song of thanks at night. Even the second fiddle in a movie can glorify his day's work by maintaining this attitude towards music.

Don't seek fame. She is a wench not worth running after. If you are worth while, fame will follow you, unasked. The kind of fame that allows herself to be caught is the kind that can be bought. It is a cheap article sold at a fancy price.

Do those things which will strengthen and ennoble your character for how else can you fulfil art's mission of expressing noble thoughts by noble means to noble minds?

Do your own criticizing of your works and deeds after setting your standards high and be ruthlessly honest and exacting in your judgment. You can then face the criticism of others with equanimity.

Address by Mr. Damrosch - concluded

Do your best, your utmost at all times whether there is money in it or not. Measuring out your talents by the pennyworth is poor policy. A great talent makes you a prince among men. Therefore be princely in your gifts. Noblesse oblige.

Then go you forth, with the blessing of your Alma Mater, to further study and to gain experience of work and of life. If you are true to your best self and to your art your lives should be happy.
