Address . . . Mr. George McAneny

Graduates:

Dr. Damrosch, members of the graduating class. ladies and gentlemen. I cannot but recall vividly, as Dr. Damrosch mentions it, that evening, or afternoon perhaps it was, so many years ago, when the beautiful Institute upon the hill, upon what we might call the city's Acropolis, was completed and turned over to the wonderful uses to which it has since been devoted. That to be exact, was nineteen years ago. I had the honor to appear on behalf of the government of the City to receive the then dedicated building into its collection of public and quasi-public architectural adornments. I imagine that very few of you, nineteen years ago, were permitted musical exercises of any kind, without due effort at suppression. But you have grown, obviously, and the school has grown greatly, Our wonder in its success and in the constant broadening of its purpose and of its accomplishment has never ceased.

What in fact has been accomplished is that one of the world's great schools of music has been raised up in New York, developed under the leadership of one of the best loved and most efficient men in music, heading a faculty numbering men and women whose fame, in turn, is almost as wide as the world of music itself. From them has been realized what New York had long hoped to have, an institution standing for music and for musical edu-

cation, worthy of its own greatness. And it is not merely that a great school of music has been founded and brought to what it is today; it is not that alone that we proclaim; but rather the character of the school. what it stands for, what it means not only to the people of the city, but to those who understand music, and live for it and love it, everywhere. The Institute has never been, and certainly is not today, a school merely for the reception of those who have decided that they would like to be taught music. Its gates are open only to those who are able to prove not only their serious purpose to work and to succeed; but, what is perhaps of even greater consequence, their initial ability. In other words, mere acceptance as a student by the Institute of Musical Art of the Juilliard School of Music is in itself a distinction of no mean measure.

And so, designed to afford opportunity widely to those who deserve it and to those who would make the most of it, the Institute continues to send forth its procession of graduates which you now join - - teachers, artists and composers of the future, and those, let us say, who, though professionally equipped, will continue to be known as amateurs in music. Through you the Institute will continue to serve its highest purposes, not only in interpreting music, but in broadening the offer to our nearby world alone, because you will undoubtedly

scatter, in some degree. You will be heard from in many places. Among you tonight there are undoubtedly those marked for honor in every field into which the great service of music subdivides.

I think that I may say to you - and you surely will not adjudge me guilty of patronizing or of attempting it - that you are among the fortunate of the earth. When a career is chosen, usually, if it be in the industries or even in the professions, preparation for the work to follow is a long and a hard hill, often involving drudgery, often those things that are dull and mean and that pass in uninteresting fashion. I do not mean that you have not had your share of hard work and of strenuous effort. Certainly you have worked for the certificates and diplomas that are coming to you tonight. But you have worked, surrounded constantly by the suggestion of beauty. You have worked with those who have taught you not only to create beauty, but to enjoy it, to live it and breathe it. And now whatever your individual careers may be, you face the future with all the inspiration that such exceptional personal experience has given you. Your years of work and study in the Institute, which as I have said, began with distinction, end tonight with greater distinction as you receive the evidences of appreciation and of approval. But the greatest thing, I can well believe, will always be the

sense of satisfaction and of the finer enjoyment of life, your conquest of music itself has given you.

In a broader way, what does not the City as a community owe to those who have created and developed the Musical Institute? What does it not owe to those who have made it possible for you, for instance - in numbers the banner class of its quarter century - to be sent forth to interpret the Institute aims and to carry its gospel of beauty farther and farther? That debt can scarcely be measured. In America we are sadly behind in the matter of state support, or even of state aid, for musical education; certainly we are far behind the nations of Europe. Excepting a Department of Music here and there in a State University, we have little that stands either for the interest or the support of the state, or of the people who are taxed for what the state provides. It is left usually, in America, to the sense of responsibility of those men and women of large private means, who feel the public need and appreciate as well the presence of their opportunities to help, where the state is laggard. Such a man built this hall, now one of the world's greatest temples of music.

In the history of the Institute of Musical Art and of the Juilliard Foundation, there are two names that will always stand brightly forward. There is that of James Loeb, who gave the first endowment of the In-

stitute as a memorial to his mother. Then there is that of Juilliard. Their endowments and others that have come, augmenting them, are now merged in one expanded and imposing institution. But we will continue to go back gratefully to the days of the founders, to the days when such beneficence counted doubly. We may be grateful indeed for the fact that the children of Betty Loeb were lovers of music and that they understood so well its place in the fabric of human existence. We may be grateful indeed for the merchant prince; that he loved and appreciated music, and so well served it.

From the impetus flowing from minds and hearts like these we owe not only the beginnings but the carrying forward of the Institute of Musical Art, complemented always by the devotion of those whose lives have been given to the carrying on of its constantly increasing routine of work, and coupled always with an efficient and happy co-operation, between Dean and Faculty and the students themselves. It is fortunately true, that, because as I think Dr. Damrosch once naively put it, the Institute neither seeks nor could it obtain a profit from its operations, because of the nature of its foundation and its endowments, it is possible to keep the conditions and rates of tuition at levels that permit the acceptance of practically all of the well-qualified who seek admission; whatever their birth, station or

means. And so the Institute has been founded upon what might be termed the true principles of democracy applied to the teaching of music, a thing made possible through the foresight and generosity of noble men and women.

I cannot speak about music in New York or of the growing understanding of its spiritual value now permeating the masses of the people; or, for that matter, of the fact that music in New York has been given its high place of today - as the other arts have taken theirs without thinking of Frank Damrosch. Who, indeed, can think of music in America without visioning that extraordinary family - Leopold Damrosch and his children who have served alike their art and their adopted land so well? It is not too much to say - and I mean it deliberately - that our people owe the progress of musical appreciation in New York chiefly to them. Not merely have they done so much to exalt the standards of all musical production and to bring new and wonderful opportunities to those who can always afford its enjoyment; but, what is better, they have brought music within the reach of thousands, tens and hundreds of thousands of their fellow-men and women, of all ranks in life, many of whom, but for them, would never have known its meaning. That I cannot but believe the people of the City well understand.

I have noted with peculiar interest and satisfaction how large a proportion of the graduates of tonight expect to assist or to work with those charged with the teaching of music in the city's public schools; and for how many years, in Cooper Union and out of it, and from many a school platform, did Frank Damrosch labor to bring to realization the splendid system under which, in the schools, today, music is both taught and practised.

Could anything be of much greater significance to the people themselves that these children, the coming generation, should be given this greater ability to appreciate, to enjoy, and to pass on the things that music gives.

And so tonight, while I congratulate you upon the success you have won, and upon the even greater opportunities that await you, I feel as though I might speak once more on behalf of the city. I cannot do it officially now, but I am sure that if, before coming here, I had sought a commission to bring you the congratulations of the people of the city, it would have been signed with enthusiasm by every man and woman in town. I feel that I may bring, too, not only their congratulations; but an assurance of their renewed appreciation of what has been done for music by the Institute, and by Frank Damrosch and those who have worked by his side.
