ASZURE BARTON (Choreographer) was born in Alberta, Canada. She is the Artistic Director of Aszure & Artists and is a 2006 Artist in Residence at the Baryshnikov Arts Center. She has created works for Mikhail Baryshnikov, Hell's Kitchen Dance, bjm_danse Montreal, Benjamin Millepied & Company, and Hubbard Street Dance Chicago II, to name a few.

Ms. Barton's choreography has been performed at the Spoleto Festival, Joyce Theater, John F. Kennedy Center, Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival, and Studio 54, among others. She recently choreographed the Broadway production of *The Threepenny Opera* starring Alan Cumming, Cyndi Lauper, Jim Dale, Ana Gasteyer, and Nellie McKay (in a new translation by Wallace Shawn, directed by Scott Elliott). She has been presented with numerous awards and grants for choreography and performance, and has choreographed several films for Bravo Television. Ms. Barton has toured and performed internationally with many companies/projects including The National Ballet of Canada, Hell's Kitchen Dance, Wendy Osserman Dance Company, and Les Ballets jazz de Montréal. She received her early training at Alberta Ballet School, Edmonton School of Ballet and the John Cranko Schule in Germany, and is a graduate of the National Ballet School in Toronto, Canada. She is delighted to be creating with the Juilliard Seniors!

MATTHEW NEENAN (Choreographer) began his dance training at the Boston Ballet School and with noted teachers Nan C. Keating and Jacqueline Cronsberg. He later attended the LaGuardia High School of Performing Arts and the School of American Ballet in New York.

In 1994, Mr. Neenan joined the Pennsylvania Ballet where he danced numerous principal roles in works by George Balanchine, John Cranko, Paul Taylor, Peter Martins, Val Caniparoli, Jorma Elo, Lila York, Meredith Rainey, Jessica Lang, Christopher Wheeldon and Jerome Robbins.

From 2000-2004 he co-founded and co-directed Phrenic New Ballet, which toured extensively and featured his choreography in New York City, Baltimore and at the Jacob's Pillow Festival in Becket, Massachusetts. In 2005, he co-founded BalletX with former PA Ballet dancer Christine Cox. Mr. Neenan's choreography has been featured by the Pennsylvania Ballet (totaling six commissions), Phrenic New Ballet, Opera Company of Philadelphia, The Russian Ballet Theatre, LaGuardia High School of Performing Arts, and Ballet Pacifica. His ballet 11:11 set to the music of Rufus Wainwright was performed at the Fall for Dance Festival at NY's City Center this past September. He has received numerous awards and grants for his choreography from the National Endowment of the Arts, Dance Advance funded by the Pew Charitable Trusts, the Choo San Goh Foundation, and the Independence Foundation. He is also a three-time recipient of grants from the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts.

In 2002, Mr. Neenan accepted an invitation to perform and teach at the Silesian International Dance Festival in Bytom, Poland. He also participated in the Fall 2003 New York City Ballet Choreographic Institute under the direction of Peter Martins. In June 2004, Dance Theatre of Pennsylvania premiered his first full-length ballet,

A Midsummer's Nights Dream. He was featured in the February 2005 issues of Dance Magazine and Philadelphia Magazine. His new production of Carmina Burana for Pennsylvania Ballet opens in March 2007. He will also be premiering a new work for Washington Ballet's 7x7 program in late spring 2007.

DAVID PARKER (Choreographer) is the artistic director of David Parker and The Bang Group (TBG), a rhythm-based theatrical dance troupe serving his intelligent fascination with the percussive possibilities of the dancing body.

TBG has been presented by Dance Theater Workshop in 5 full-evening productions and presented by Danspace Project at Saint Mark's Church in two. They have also been presented in New York City by Symphony Space, Arts and Events at the Winter Garden at the World Financial Center, DanceNowNYC at Joe's Pub, Lincoln Center Out-of-Doors and many others. During the past ten years the company has appeared in The Netherlands, Belgium, France, Italy, Switzerland, Austria, Slovakia, Czech Republic, Croatia, Scotland, Germany, Canada and Monaco, and in nearly 25 US states. Mr. Parker's comic/subversive neo-vaudeville Nutcracker entitled Nut/Cracked has been a break-out hit for TBG. Originally co-commissioned by Dance Theater Workshop and the Carlo Felice Opera House in Genoa, Italy, it has toured for the past four seasons in the United States and Europe and was recently identified by the Boston Herald as "...the most ingenious re-staging of the beloved Christmas ballet made in the past 20 years."

Mr. Parker's long term collaboration with Dutch avant-garde fashion designers, Melanie Rozema and Jereoen Teunissen has resulted in five works, including the notorious duet for Velcro-clad men entitled *Slapstuck*, which won a 2002 New York Dance and Performance ("Bessie") Award for design in 2002. Mr. Parker also has won choreographic prizes and citations from the Kurt Jooss Awards jury, the Nijinsky Awards jury in Monte Carlo and the Fourth International Competition for Choreographers of Contemporary Dance in The Netherlands.

Among Mr. Parker's dances are commissioned works for The Arena di Verona Ballet in Verona, Italy; The American Dance Festival, The Anna Sokolow Theater Dance Ensemble, The Barnard/DTW Project, University of Maryland Dance Ensemble, University of Illinois at Champaign Urbana and Summer Stages Dance Festival in Concord, Massachusetts where his company has been in residence each summer since 2000. The Company has received generous support from the New York Foundation for the Arts, The Greenwall Foundation, The Jerome Robbins Foundation, the 2wice Foundation, The Netherland-America Foundation, Arts International, The Fund for Mutual Understanding and several private donors.

Upcoming projects include the Company's spring season at Dance Theater Workshop in May with a new evening-length work, and new works commissioned by the Ground Works Dance Company in Cleveland, Pittsburgh Dance Alloy, Summer Stages Dance Festival, The University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana and a return engagement of *Nut/Cracked* to Boston in December 2007. He recently made his debut as a writer in the November 2006 issue of *Dance Magazine*. For more information please visit www.thebanggroup.com.

DOUG VARONE (Choreographer) is a choreographer of contemporary dance for the concert stage, as well as opera, Broadway, regional theater, film and television. He is the Artistic Director of Doug Varone and Dancers, which he established in 1986 as an opportunity to explore and process his particular choreographic vision. The company tours extensively throughout the United States, Europe, South America and Asia, performing regularly at preeminent venues and festivals.

Mr. Varone is the recipient of numerous honors including a Guggenheim Fellowship, a New York Dance and Performance Award (Bessie) for Sustained Achievement in Choreography and, most recently, a 2006 OBIE Award for his production of Ricky Ian Gordon's Orpheus and Euridice at Lincoln Center. His work has been supported annually by the NEA since 1988. In addition to his own company, Mr. Varone has been commissioned by numerous dance companies: including the Limón Company, Dancemakers (Canada), Batsheva Dance Company (Israel), Uppercut Danse (Denmark), AnCreative (Japan), Dayton Contemporary Dance Company and Colorado Ballet.

Mr. Varone is also known as a choreographer and director for opera. He choreographed a new production of Stravinsky's Le Sacre du Printemps for New York's Metropolitan Opera (2003) and returned in the spring of 2004 for a new production of Strauss' Salome. Last season he choreographed The Met's World Premiere production of Tobias Picker's An American Tragedy. Other opera credits include Berlioz' Les Troyens, (The Metropolitan Opera); Wagner's Die Walküre (Washington Opera); the American premiere of Antheil's Transatlantic (Minnesota Opera) and Rossini's Il Viaggio a Reims (New York City Opera)., among others. He both directed and choreographed Gluck's Orfée et Eurydice and Rossini's Il Barbiere di Siviglia for Opera Colorado, and the American premiere of Laurent Petitgerard's The Elephant Man for Minnesota Opera. Varone is also active in theater, television and film. His theater credits include Broadway's Triumph of Love and productions at Baltimore's Center Stage, Yale Repertory Theater, Walnut Street Theater, Princeton's McCarter Theater, Music Theater Group, The Vineyard Theater, Via Theater, and the Aquila Theatre Company. Choreography for television and fashion include the dance and underwater sequences of the A&E Network production, The Planets (nominated for an International Emmy and Grammy Award for Long Form Video) and designer Geoffrey Beene's Couture Fashion Ballets in NYC. His collaboration with photographer Michael Thompson was commissioned by and featured in W magazine. Born in Syosset, NY, Mr. Varone received his Bachelor's Degree in Fine Arts from Purchase College.

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FRITZ MASTEN (Costume Designer) has designed costumes and sets for many forms of theater across the country. He was a "best costumes" nominee for the 2005 Joseph Jefferson award and was a short listed nominee for last season's Project Runway. His design is presented on the cover of the winter issue of *Pointe Magazine* worn by American Ballet Theater ballerina Julie Kent. This is his fifth season designing for the Juilliard Dance Division.

NICOLE PEARCE (Lighting Designer) designed lighting for The Juilliard School Dance Division Composers and Choreographers 2005. Bessie Schönberg (1906-1997)

Bessie Schönberg, foremost dance educator and an icon in the downtown New York dance world because of the eponymous annual Bessie awards, was born in Germany, where she studied Dalcroze Eurythmics. She began her training in dance after she came to the United States in 1926 and settled in New York. There she studied with Martha Graham and performed with her company from 1929 to 1931. Martha Hill, founder of the Juilliard Dance Division, had taught her earlier and she became Hill's assistant at Bennington College. She began teaching at Sarah Lawrence College in 1938. On becoming chair of the dance department she developed an approach to teaching dance composition in which she devised problems for her students to solve, rather than impose her own style, thus leading them to what they were trying to create. Schönberg taught widely and was a member of the faculty of Juilliard from 1992 until her death. In 1999 she was named one of America's Irreplaceable Dance Treasures by the Dance Heritage Coalition.
